

Dear 4-H Leaders and Families:

Recently, a survey of 4-H volunteer leaders in Los Angeles was conducted, and the results were mailed to all 4-H leaders. If you did not receive a copy, and would like to get one, please let me know and I will be happy to get one out to you. Based on the survey results it's clear that we have some work to do to make the 4-H Leader's job easier. We want to make sure our Leaders have the support they need to continue doing a fantastic job reaching kids in their communities. Here are the areas it seems most important to focus on in the coming months:

1. Communication.

Not everyone is getting information in a timely way. 4-H has so many wonderful events, but yet kids are missing out, because information is not getting to them. I am beginning a project to use email to get information out on a more frequent basis to all 4-H Leaders, including community club leaders and project leaders. If you are not receiving emails from me with brief updates and important calendar items, please email me at ramabie@ucdavis.edu, and I will add you to my distribution list. I am happy to add any families as well that would like to be kept posted by email. Regarding communications with the 4-H office, email and phone calls to the 4-H office should be returned within 24 hours. Please let me know if you find that's not the case. It is common that you may call and will need to leave a message. This is because Roy Hillstock, who answers the main 4-H line, at (323) 260-3854, is also our in-house computer specialist. If Roy does not answer the phone, it's because he's away from his desk helping someone with a computer issue. Please leave your name, number, your question, and a time that's good to get back to you. You may also call me directly at (323) 260-3886. Although I do attend many meetings, I am often at my desk available to assist you.

2. Clover Notes

Not everyone uses email or the internet, or has daily convenient access. Based on the survey feedback, it is not working for everyone to have Clover Notes as an on-line only resource. It appears that many people still need a hard copy and that lack of the hard copy may be impacting participation at our events. So, we are going to return to mailing a hard copy for those who want it in early 2006. We hope that to help us save costs, those of you who are comfortable with the on-line format will opt-out of the printed version. We will be sending a mailing to you about this.


3. Enrollment.

Enrollment has declined in the 4-H program. Therefore, we want to make it as easy as possible for leaders to sign up new 4-H participants. Based on concerns about enrollment, a new option will be provided that will allow for enrollment of new members throughout the program year. This option will be selected by the community club leader, if he/she feels it will be helpful and can be accommodated at the club level. This will not be practical for every club, but those club leaders who want to try it will have that option. Community club leaders will be receiving more information about this in the next week.

There are many other ideas for the future as well, including updating our website to make it more user-friendly. We will work on that one in 2006. 2006 4-H Beekeeping Essay Contest

The Foundation for the Preservation of Honey Bees, Inc. has announced the essay topic and rules for the 2006 4-H Beekeeping Essay Contest. There will be three cash prizes for the national winners: 1st Place, \$250; 2nd Place, \$100; and 3rd Place, \$50. Each state winner, including the national winners, will receive an appropriate book about honey bees, beekeeping, or honey.

The Essay Topic is: Honey Bees in Art and Culture.

From the beginning of the relationship of honey bees and mankind, honey bees have been woven into art and culture. Essayists should examine the roles not only of honey bees but also of honey and beeswax in art and culture. [Hint: look up "encaustic wax painting" and "lost wax casting."]

Sources of information: Good leads for your research include search engines on the Web, school and public libraries, local beekeepers, your county Extension agent, your local or state beekeepers' association, and the beekeeping professor at your state's agricultural college. The American Beekeeping Federation (sponsor of the contest) website <www.ABFnet.org> has links to other beekeeping sites. The 2005 winning essays also are published on ABFnet.

The scope of the research is an essential judging criterion, accounting for 40% of your score. The number of sources consulted, the authority of the sources, and the variety of the sources all are evaluated.

Personal interviews with beekeepers and others familiar with the subject are valued sources of information and should be documented. Sources that are not cited in the endnotes should be listed in a "Resources" or "Bibliography" list.

Note that honey bee is properly spelled as two words, even though many otherwise authoritative references spell it as one word.

- Rules: 1. Contest open to active (dues paid) 4-H members only. Previous winners of 1^{st} , 2^{nd} , or 3^{rd} place at the national level are not eligible, but previous state winners are.
 - 2. Requirements (failure to meet any one of these disqualifies the essay)
 - a. Text to be typewritten or computer-generated, double spaced, 12 point Times or similar type style, on one side of white paper, following standard manuscript form.
 - b. Write on designated subject, only.
 - c. All factual statements must be referenced with bibliographical-style endnotes.

- d. The length of the essay, proper, is to be 750-1,000 words, not including endnotes, the bibliography or references, or the essayist's biographical sketch.
- e. The essayist will include a brief biographical sketch, including date of birth, gender, complete mailing address and telephone number.
- 3. Essays will be judged on (a) scope of research -40%; (b) accuracy -30%; (c) creativity -10%; (d) conciseness -10%; and (e) logical development of the topic (10%).
- 4. Completed California essays must be mailed in order to be received on or before Friday, February 17th, 2006 by Dr. Eric Mussen, Entomology Department, University of California, One Shields Avenue, Davis, CA 95616. The winning state essay will be forwarded to the national competition and the results should be made available on May 1st, 2006. All national entries become the property of the Foundation for the Preservation of Honey Bees, Inc. and may be published or used as it sees fit. No essay will be returned (save a copy for your Record Book before you submit the final text).

4-H Japanese Exchange

In 2006, California will be participating in the outbound month-long program. California 4-H members and leaders can travel to Japan for a month-long stay with host families from July 12 to August 10, 2006.

4-H links with a youth development organization in Japan called Labo. Participants, ages 14 to 19, live with a family and see Japan through the everyday experiences. This is an opportunity to experience life in Japan from the inside - not as a tourist. Host families eagerly introduce California teens to life in Japan. Teens may request a specific host family or a family with a teen the same gender and close in age, with similar interests and hobbies, will be selected by Labo.

For those who wish to spend more time in Japan, Labo also offers the Nihongo Program, an intensive three-week Japanese language program. This program begins June 15 and ends just prior to the four-week home-stay program. Participants live with Japanese families in the Tokyo area and attend Japanese language classes five days a week at the Labo Center.

Through this program, participants can:

- Share cultures, customs, and heritage with Japanese youth.
- Learn to value diversity and show respect and understanding for others.
- Increase their language and communication skills
- Increase their compassion for people new to our culture.
- Develop understanding of issues related to living in a global society.
- Improve self understanding.

2006 National 4-H Conference Call for Workshop Proposals

National 4-H Headquarters, USDA is now accepting workshop proposals for the 2006 National 4-H Conference, March 25-30, 2006.

The 2006 National 4-H Conference theme, "Connect 4-H—Let's Get Together!" reflects the many connections we have within and across 4-H, including the Essential Elements of the 4-H Youth Development Program—independence, belonging, generosity, and mastery. When there are sustained opportunities for young people to gain a sense of independence, belonging, generosity, and mastery, youth can master skills to make life choices, effectively contribute to decision-making and act responsibly, and positively influence their communities and beyond.

A major goal of the 2006 National 4-H Conference is to offer participants a rich and meaningful personal and professional development experience through a comprehensive understanding of the Essential Elements of the 4-H Youth Development Program. Each workshop will focus on one of the four essential elements of youth development and be led by a team of youth and adults. Workshops will be meaningful, fun, and of the genre that "gets folks out of their seats and ready for action." Workshop facilitators will provide participants with a "toolkit" that will assist them in applying what they learned back home.

Conference delegates are strongly encouraged to submit workshop proposals. Proposals from teams other than National 4-H Conference delegates are welcome; please review the workshop materials on the conference Web site for additional information about visiting presenters.

This communication is required for a workshop proposal to be considered for the conference.

National 4-H Headquarters extends an invitation, on behalf of the Secretary of Agriculture, to each land-grant institution to send a delegation of youth, adult volunteers, and/or Extension professional staff to the National 4-H Conference. Each state/institution has their own processes for identifying and selecting their delegates. Please contact your 4-H office to learn more about representing your state or institution at the National 4-H Conference. Delegation coordinators in each state have been notified that preliminary registration is open through November 14, 2005.

The conference will be held March 25-30, 2006 at the National 4-H Youth Conference Center – operated by our private partner, National 4-H Council – in Chevy Chase, Maryland.
