

Fountain of Youth



October 2006

50%....of 2,500 children who responded affirmatively about how often they were awoken nightly by incoming text messages on their mobile phone, and about how tired they felt afterwards. Sept. 13, 2003 issue of the *Journal of Sleep Research*, researcher Jan Van den Bulck, Ph.D., as cited in *The Brown University Child and Adolescent Behavior Letter*, 19 (11), November 2003.)

61%...of 13 to 17 year-olds that have a personal profile on a site such as MySpace, Friendster, or Xanga. 50% have also posted pictures of themselves online.

71%...reported receiving messages online from someone they don't know.

45%...have been asked for personal information by someone they don't know.

30%...have considered meeting someone that they've only talked to online

14%...have actually met a person face-to-face they they've only spoken to over the internet (9% of 13-15s; 22% of 16-17s).

40%...teens who received messages online from someone they don't know reported that they'll usually reply and chat with that person. Only 18% said they'll tell an adult.

20%...teens report that it is safe (i.e., "somewhat" or "very safe") to share personal information on a public blog or networking site.

37%... of 13 to 17 year-olds said they are "not very concerned" or "not at all concerned" about someone using information they've posted online in ways they don't want. (Teenage Research Unlimited. Teen Internet Safety Survey. National Center for Missing & Exploited Children and Cox Communications, 2006.)

14.4%...of eleventh-grade girls are significantly more likely than boys to report not engaging in vigorous or moderate physical activity (7.8% of boys, and 15.2% of twelfth-grade girls vs. 8.7% of boys). (Center for Disease Control and Prevention. 2002. Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System2001, Table 40. MMWR: CDC Surveillance Summaries 49 (No.SS-5):1-94).

National News

4-H joins National Geographic campaign to help boost kids' global IQ

National Geographic and leaders from the business, nonprofit and education communities unveiled a public-engagement campaign designed to give U.S. students tools to become more informed global citizens. The goal of the five-year multimedia campaign — My Wonderful World — is to improve the geographic literacy of young people ages 8-17 by motivating parents and educators to expand geographic offerings in school, at home and in their communities.

Coalition partners include 4-H, American Federation of Teachers, Anheuser-Busch Adventure Parks, Asia Society, Association of American Geographers, Budget Rent-A-Car, Committee for Economic Development, Council on Competitiveness, ESRI, GLOBE Program, iEARN-USA (International Education and Resource Network), Lindblad Expeditions, NBA Cares, National Council for Geographic Education, National Council of La Raza, National Council for the Social Studies, National PTA, Sesame Workshop, Smithsonian Institution, United Nations Foundation and the World Affairs Councils of America.

A rich Web site at the heart of the campaign, <u>MyWonderfulWorld.org</u>, provides resources for parents to help kids be more geo-savvy. It includes suggestions for simple, outdoor family activities and ways that parents can work to get more geography into the classroom, links to geography games and online adventures for kids and teens, classroom materials for educators, and ways for young and old to test their global IQs. The site also provides tools for communicating to policymakers and education leaders the importance of geographic literacy.


