Policy Highlight of the Month: The 4-H Organizational Structure

Volunteers and Families,

We are starting a feature in the Clover Notes that will highlight an aspect of the 4-H Policy Manual to begin to acquaint you with the policies that guide, support and govern the University of California 4-H Youth Development Program. Each month's highlight will feature either a current or relevant issue we are confronting in the county or an aspect of the policy manual we feel needs special attention. To re-enforce the use of the policy manual, we will also conduct a policy manual training during one of the four scheduled volunteer trainings during the program year.

First, let me mention that the 4-H Policy Handbook is fully searchable document that allows you to navigate directly to where you want to go in the manual. Just type in a word or phrase in the search box, and voila, a list of options are before you. It's a very nice feature.

For our first feature, I thought I'd start out with some basic understanding of the roles within the 4-H Youth Development Program. As you know, 4-H is a part of the University of California Cooperative. This designation is absolutely critical and important to the 4-H program. It connects the program to a larger and ever so important institution, the land grant university system and is unlike any other youth development program in the country. This connection to the land grant system (in California, it's the University of California) designation is unique, historical and purposeful.

For a lot of volunteers there is uncertainty of the roles each staff person has in the 4-H Youth Development Program. The policy manual outlines in specific terms the various roles that make up the staff and support for the 4-H program. In Los Angeles County, we have a County Director, a 4-H Youth Development Advisor and two Program Representatives (one of them is 60% time). We have other program support staff, too. They include an Administrative Assistant and a technology expert. These are the characters with whom you will most likely interact.

Please pay particular attention to the reporting relationships featured in the organizational structure (<u>https://fourh.ucdavis.edu/4hresource/4-HOrgChart.pdf</u>). The flow chart outlines the reporting relationships and should be adhered to ensure local program quality and effectiveness.
