Policy Highlight of the Month: 4-H Essential Elements

While the program year officially started July 1, many of you will begin hosting your community club and project meetings this month. As we greet new members and families to 4-H as well as welcome back returning families, we are reminded of the significant role that 4-H plays in the lives of youth and their families. In a lot of cases, 4-H is situated as the central out of school/after school extra-curricular activity for youth. This gives us a unique opportunity to enhance their lives in meaningful and engaging ways. One way to do this is to be sure that we understand and are committed to the 4-H Essential Elements. The elements are guideposts to help us gauge the effectiveness of our programs and projects. They remind us that youth do not join 4-H, they Belong to 4-H; they have a chance to Master relevant skills; they become connected to the larger community through Generosity; they learn to make choices by practicing Independence. Every project and project meeting, all 4-H events and experiences should provide every youth access to any or all of the 4-H elements.

I refer you the 4-H Policy Handbook to get more information on the 4-H Essential Elements. I would also encourage you to ask yourself these questions when planning the next 4-H experience (i.e., club meeting, project meeting, All-Star meeting):

- 1. Do youth have an opportunity to build skills toward mastery?
- 2. Are youth involved in the planning and execution of the meeting or experience?
- 3. Will this experience be remembered?
- 4. Will the youth have a chance to practice and to apply their learning?

Livestock Judging

Over the last 100 years, 4-H members have "learned by doing" through numerous projects across the country. Livestock projects are one of the many ways youth gain meaningful experience in the raising, on-going care, and showing of an animal at fairs and various competitions. Youth learn how to present their project animals in the best possible light, and in doing so, learn how to present themselves through proper showmanship etiquette as well.

Part of raising, training and caring for a project animal can mean learning how to raise a good animal for a market meat

product. Prior to their sale at fairs and auctions, there is a strict judging process the animals must go through, including the basic principles and fundamentals of style and balance, muscling, structural correctness, overall frame, abnormalities, weight, breeding and finish. 4-H youth are encouraged to use critical thinking skills and learn the methods of judging, through SET activities, project work, and participating in judging-related activities throughout the year. Most times, if a 4-Her is raising a meat product, youth will need to learn what judging an animal involves, and this will provide the knowledge necessary to raise and train the best animal possible.

Recently, some exemplary 4-Hers from Quartz Hill 4-H Club & Leona Valley Racketeers 4-H Club have really worked hard to put their critical thinking skills to use in judging livestock. Tia Picard, Aubrie Horwedel, Felicia Byrne and Tearah Kerr participated in the Fresno Livestock Judging Competition, and in November, will be headed to Kansas for the National Livestock Judging Competition. Each of the girls have participated in 4-H for over nine years and will be representing the State of California in the much anticipated competition.

During these judging events, more than just luck is needed! The girls are enrolled in a *Livestock* Judging Project, where they also fine-tune their livestock judging skills. These events involve a separation of the team, wherein each team member individually judges various species including steers, heifers, sheep, swine and goats. They then sort the groups they are judging, and using both the Danish and American Judging Systems, rank the animals from best to worse. When all the judging has concluded, and all the



individual scores sheets are turned in and tallied, an overall score is computed for each team. Tia, Aubrie, Felicia and Tearah did an outstanding job here in California using their critical thinking skills, and made team-work look easy! We are sending our best wishes to the girls at the *American Royal* held in Kansas City, and hope that their hard work will inspire other Los Angeles County 4-H youth to learn more about livestock judging, and even take a closer look at the LA County 4-H Judging Day activities.

- County Record Book Judging All LA County 4-H Junior, Intermediate and Senior members are invited to enter their 4-H records (on the state forms) in the county competition. Record Books due to the LA and AV offices by 4pm September 15, 2009. Record Books are due to the I&R committee members by 10pm on September 16, 2009. Record Book judging will be September 19 & 26, 2009 with winners announced at County Awards Day, October 10, 2009 after the 4-H Pet Symposium. Remember to enter your 4-H activity information on the "new" state record book forms.
- 2008-2009 Officer Book competition Officer books for the 2008-2009 competition will be due to the 4-H Office (LA or AV) by 4 p.m, on September 15, 2009. The book must be submitted with a completed ID form. The 2009 ID form and guidelines are available online at: http://celosangeles.ucdavis.edu/4H_Youth_Development_Programs/Applications.htm. Start planning to enter an officer book now. Earn a medal for your officer book. Medals are given for Best in District and Best in County in each of the seven categories of the competition: President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Reporter, Historian, and Other Officers.

The books will be judged on September 19, 2009. Experienced leaders are requested to volunteer as judges. Contact Noel Keller (909) 621-2373 to volunteer to judge. The results will be announced in the district Achievement programs, usually in October.

- **Preventing the Spread Of Communicable Diseases** Clover Safe notes are intended primarily for 4-H volunteers and members nine years and older. Each year, an average of more than 200,000 people are hospitalized and 36,000 people die from seasonal influenza (flu) complications in the United States. You can help keep yourself, your family, and your fellow 4-H volunteers and members healthy and prevent the spread of seasonal colds, flu, and other communicable diseases by practicing some simple measures at home, work, school, and other social settings. In fall of 2009, there is particular concern over the novel H1N1 influenza virus (also known as swine flu). The precautions to protect yourself from H1N1 are the same as those recommended for seasonal flu or other common communicable illnesses.
