Policy

Policy Highlight of the Month Code of Conduct

The 4-H Youth Development Program strives to offer youth participants a meaningful, engaging, safe and healthy environment. Youth are expected to abide by the 4-H Code of Conduct at all times, including during events and activities outside of the club and county. Similarly, there is an expectation that adult volunteers adhere to a volunteer code of conduct (http://www.ca4h.org/policy/chapter6/index.asp#IV) to maintain program coherence and consistency. In addition, adult volunteers have roles and responsibilities that help to govern their actions. Some of the roles include:

- implementing the programs
- providing logistical support for meetings and events
- directing the educational service to youth

Adult volunteers also are integral to maintaining community relationships and being a conduit for youth to larger community resources.

Parents and other adults also play a significant role in the success of the program. They provide transportation to club meetings, events and activities. In some cases, they serve as an enrolled resource leader to be a chaperone for camp or other overnight events. Like volunteers, they must agree to a set of behavioral guidelines to attend or participate in these 4-H events. While the consequences for non-compliance will not necessarily result in a youth's dismissal from the program, it could have an adverse affect on the overall learning environment of the club and its activities. We encourage all parents to understand their role with the program. For example, parents are expected to:

- Treat others in a courteous, respectful manner demonstrating ethical behaviors appropriate to a positive role model for youth.
- Abide by policies and guidelines of the California 4-H Youth Development Program state and county 4-H programs.
- Obey all laws of the locality, state, and nation, including those related to use of illegal substances, or use of firearms.
- Recognize that verbal, sexual, physical abuse, and/or neglect of youth is unacceptable either within or outside the 4-H Youth Development Program.
- Treat animals humanely and teach 4-H youth to provide appropriate animal care.

- Operate machinery, vehicles, and other equipment in a safe and responsible manner, and only with a valid operator's license and the legally required insurance coverage.
- Handle fundraising and finances in an ethical manner according to the policies and guidelines of the 4-H Youth Development Program.
- Do not consume alcohol while responsible for youth in 4-H activities nor allow 4-H youth participants under your supervision to consume alcohol or illegal substances.
- Deliver your child on time for events and meetings, and pick-up at the agreed upon time.
- Avoid the use of obscene, impolite, and/or discriminatory language at any 4-H activity or where youth are present.
