### **Policy Highlight of the Month**

### **4-H Policy Update (Thrive)**

Happy New Year 4-H Family. 2011 will mark 109 years of 4-H! Think about that for a moment . . . Makes your head swirl, huh? 4-H is the oldest and possibly the most successful public youth development program in the history of the country. That means that your contribution to the program has meant thousands of young people have benefitted from quality experiences through projects and events that have given them meaning and purpose. In order to maintain the tradition of meaningful experiences, 4-H continues to evolve and grow to meet the needs of youth through innovation in youth development. One exciting and very promising approach the California 4-H program is embarking upon is the 4-H Step it Up to Thrive. Peter Benson (2008) defines thrives as:

At its core, thriving is about communities where young people feel and know that they are persons of value and worth; that they have something unique to offer the world; and that they have the courage to act on their gifts.

Many of you may agree, that this is precisely what 4-H is all about. We want to develop thriving youth whose futures and life visions are harnessed and developed through the 4-H program. That makes your role invaluable. The Los Angeles County 4-H program is in the process of developing a Thriving Team to help our program begin the transition of intentionally incorporating the Thrive message throughout the program. Incorporation includes:

- developing youth self-reflection skills
- teaching a common language for thriving
- providing holistic view of personal development
- inspiring youth to create visions for their futures
- motivating youth to work toward meaningful goals

In the coming days and weeks we will begin to share more information on 4-H Thrive. I urge you to visit the California 4-H website (<u>http://www.ca4h.org/About/Thrive/</u>) for more information on the rationale and research supporting Thrive.

#### • A Fair to Remember

The history of the *Monte Farmer's Fair* leads back to El Monte, California, in 1935, when **Otto H. Kruse** launched a small feed mill, *O.H. Kruse Grain & Milling*. Otto's son, **Richard**, was born at the mill location, as were his brothers and sisters. From a young age, Richard worked closely with his father Otto to make their aspiring feed mill an American success story.

In addition to working in the mill for most of his life, Richard graduated from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and served in the U.S. Navy. In 1978, Richard opened **Kruse Feed & Supply** in the original feed mill where he was born and raised.

As the years passed, and the family business grew, in 1987 the La Habra store was opened with much excitement. What started as a small mill, has now grown into the largest livestock feed producer in California, and one of the largest in the Nation, *Western Milling*. The hard-working Kruse family is still diligently serving the public from various locations throughout the state today. Richard recently informed me of the sad news that the original El Monte location will be closing its doors in January for good, due to the lack of livestock needs in the area.

In 1957, through generosity, and an interest in 4-H and the welfare of youth, Otto and his Uncle Adolph launched the first-ever **Monte Farmer's Fair** at the mill location, where it remained until 1975. On this **51<sup>st</sup> Anniversary** of the **Monte Farmer's Fair**, we would like to thank the Kruse family for a historical event all North San Gabriel 4-Hers and the public can enjoy year after year.

This year, the **Monte Farmer's Fair** will be held on **January 24<sup>th</sup> from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.** at the Good Shepherd Lutheran School in Eagle Rock (6338 N. Figueroa Ave. Los Angeles, CA 90042). Entries will be accepted starting at **8:30 a.m.** 

Participants are from the North San Gabriel District. In order to participate, members need to contact their club leader for entry forms. Entries for the **Monte Farmer's Fair** can include: Home Economics, Arts & Crafts, Small Livestock, Dogs and Cats. There will be a food booth, auction, awards, and several Skill Workshops.

Even if you are not submitting an entry, please stop by and say hello to all those who have worked hard on their projects, take part in a piece of history, and enjoy a lovely day with us, thanks to the life's work of the Kruse Family!

#### • Goals for new 4-H year

The new 2007-2008 4-H year has started. Encourage your members to start making their 4-H plans. What projects will they take? What community service projects will they support? What activities could they plan and organize for their club? Are they ready to be a Junior or Teen Leader next year? Do they have a good idea for an Emerald Star project? Do they want to go to 4H summer camp this year? Could they be on the Camp Staff?

Now is the time to plan your 4-H year. Do you want to focus in one project area? Plan a presentation, a speech, a leadership and community service for that project area. Do you want to try for the next 4-H star rank? What do you need to earn that next rank?

Experienced seniors should be considering doing a state application for project recognition and a chance to be state winner. Now is the time to start working on the application for next year. If you start now, you'll see where your experiences are lacking and still have time to add items into your records. Make this a great project year and go for STATE WINNER. #### • Hints for New 4-H Members

The following are some suggestions for new members to help you get the most out of your 4-H experience:

- Attend all your club and project meetings, if possible. If you must miss meetings for health and/or family emergency reasons, be sure to let your leader know before the meeting and make arrangements for make-up, if necessary. That's part of learning to be a responsible person.
- Read newsletters from your club and the county newsletter, "Clover Notes". They let you know about the important dates and activities you can be part of.
- Ask questions when you don't understand, or need help. Key club and project leaders, teen leaders, county All-Stars, and the 4-H Office are all here to help you. Good luck with your involvement and above all, have fun.

#### • Junior/Teen Leader

Junior Leaders are 4-H members in the 7th and 8th grade who help lead a 4-H project. Teen Leaders are 4-H members in 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th and above grades who lead a 4-H project. To be a Junior/Teen Leader, the member needs to be enrolled in their club's Leadership Project. They fill out the goals and plans of the first two sections of the Leadership Plan and Report Form, and have the form signed by their Leadership Project Leader and the leader of the project for which they will be a youth leader. While they are a Junior or Teen Leader, they can wear the Junior or Teen Leader patch on their 4-H hat. At the end of the year, they will need to complete the Leadership Plan and Report and have it signed by their Leadership Project Leader and their project leader. They should also complete an Annual Project Report for the Leadership Project.

#### • Hi 4-H

Each district can have a Hi 4-H program. 4-H members who will be at least 14 years old by January 1, 2008 or who will be in 9th grade and above are eligible for Hi 4-H activities (ROPES, Snow Camp, T.I.C. conference, state leadership conference, etc.). You don't have to attend Hi 4-H meetings to attend the special Hi 4-H events. This year 13 year olds are again invited to attend Hi 4-H activities as guests.

The sectional level Hi 4-H is called the Sectional Teen Council. It meets before sectional 4-H Leaders' Council meetings at Mt. SAC. The Teen Council plans social and educational events, plus runs the T.I.C. conference in January and a food booth at sectional field day in May. Our senior members can be part of the Teen Council. Our senior members can attend their events. Consider being more active on the sectional level. The county level Hi 4-H program will only exist if there is sufficient interest this year. #### • Be a 4-H All-Star

All-Star is the highest rank that a 4-H member can achieve at the County level. The All-Star award affords 4-H members the opportunity to further develop their leadership skills on a countywide basis. Each year Los Angeles County selects several 4-H members who have applied and are deserving of this rank to become All-Stars. The Los Angeles County 4-H Program expects its All-Stars to contribute to the 4-H Program during the next program year. For more information go to:

#### • Emerald Star Project

If a member has earned Gold Star Rank or will be 16 years old by January 1, 2011, they can consider doing an advanced leadership project and earn an Emerald Star for their hat. An Emerald Star Project can be started at any time during the year. Do you have an idea for an activity you could plan and run to benefit the county 4-H program or your community? Call the 4-H office at (323) 260-3854 for a packet of information on the Emerald Star Program.

#### • Leadership Merit Award

Start planning now to earn a Junior or Teen Leadership award. Think of something to make your leadership special this year. Try something new to bring more interest and enjoyment to your project. Try to expand your leadership beyond the club. For this award, you need to be in the Leadership Project in your club. If your club does not have a Leadership Project, talk with your club leader about starting one. If she has questions about this, have your club leader contact Noel Keller (909-621-2373) or someone on the I&R Committee. You will need to fill out an annual project report for your Leadership Project. You will also need to complete a leadership plan report.

#### • Don't sit back - STEP UP!!

4-H has so much to offer youth. There are great sources of information, chances for career exploration, opportunities to work with the latest technology, chances to learn and practice leadership, opportunities to help others and make a difference. All this will not happen if you just sit back and do not become really involved. You have to take ACTION. You have to STEP UP and DO IT! If something is not happening as you had hoped for, perhaps someone needs your help to make it happen or you are not doing your part. With everyone working together, 4-H can really be GREAT! Remember TO MAKE THE BEST BETTER!



#### • Record Books - What Are They?

In the 4-H Youth Development Program, there are many long-standing traditions and we may not know why we do them, or where they came from. 4-H youth members are encouraged to keep written records and documentation of their events and activities and submit them annually with a special green cover that says, "Member Record." For those new leaders and members, you might be wondering some of the following:



#### What is a Record Book?

4-H Record Books are an important form of keeping a written record/summary throughout the year of project work, events and activities, community service and overall learning and participation in the 4-H Youth Development Program. They are submitted for judging and competition at the Club, County level, and sometimes at the State level.

#### Why do a Record Book?

Record Books are a great way for members to reflect on what they have learned in many areas of their 4-H experience. It makes us look back on the year and say, "Hey! Look at all I have accomplished!" Over the years, our record books give us an extensive full picture of commitment, achievement and success in a job well done. Completing a Record Book also helps teach us:

- o Personal skills in financial management
- Personal accountability
- Record useful information
- Preserve our fun memories of our 4-H experience
- Provides a tool to share with others
- o Helps us plan what we would like to do/accomplish in the next year
- Learn about planning and goal setting
- o Learn how to document in a complete manner
- Will be a great tool when applying for college, jobs or scholarships

#### When do I start my Record Book?

• You should start keeping your records at the beginning of each 4-H year (July 1-June 30) and continue to do so all year long.

#### Where can I get a Record Book cover?

- You can also use your own plain, 2-pronged cover (ACCO) which you can find at a nearby stationery store.

#### What are the key elements in a Record Book?

- o Personal Development Report
- o 4-H Story
- Project Record Report (for each project you are enrolled in)
- o Supplemental Materials (photos, newspaper articles, SET Activities, etc.)

#### What are some Helpful Hints for a Good Record Book?

- Make sure to visit the State 4-H Website to view requirements and download forms at: <u>http://www.recordbookresources.com/</u>
- Include photos of you doing what you have mentioned in your Record Book.
- Write captions under the photos explaining what you are doing.
- Write as neatly as you can-- typing would be even better!
- o Document club and project events right after they occur so that they will be fresh in your mind.
- Include a title page, table of contents and tabs if you really want to impress the judges!

#### Can Primary Members (members age 5-8) turn in a Record Book?

Yes, to their Community Club Leader. Included in a Primary Record Book should be:

- o A Primary Personal Development Report
- A Project Report Form for a Primary Project (listing the things they were involved in)

\*Primary Record Books do not compete at the County level as Primary competition is prohibited. They are only reviewed by the Community Club Leader. Primary Record Books are a great tool in which to start the practice of keeping records.

#### Will there be a workshop to learn more about Record Books?

Throughout the course of the year, Record Book Workshops will be provided by the Los Angeles County 4-H Office.

#### When are Record Books due?

Record Books are due to the County Office on **Tuesday**, **September 14, 2011**, by **4:00 p.m.** or by **9:00 p.m.** to an **Incentives & Recognition Committee Member** on **Wednesday**, **September 15, 2011**.

#### If members of my club are turning in Record Books, do I have to help judge other clubs' Record Books?

Yes. #### How do I compete on the State level with my Record Book?

It is not necessary to turn your book in to the County first, but it is good practice. The Los Angeles County Incentives and Recognition Committee will review your book for you and provide suggestions if you turn it in to them by September 29<sup>th</sup>. You must be a Senior 4-H Member (14-19 as of January 1, 2011). State Record Books must include:

- o Personal Development Report
- o 4-H Story
- Project Report (for each project you are enrolled in)
- o Supplemental Materials (including photos, newspaper articles, SET Activities, etc.)
- o Junior Teen Leadership Report

Senior (State) Record Books should demonstrate outstanding achievement in:


- Project Work
- Life Skills Development

#### • Plough Monday

January symbolizes the start of the New Year, and with it, renewed hope of accomplishments, success in school and with our clubs, and for many, wishes for continued good health, prosperity and the idea that we are just that much closer to summer vacation!

There are many beloved traditions that we participate in throughout the year, and I came across an interesting one-- Plough Monday. Plough Monday is traditionally celebrated in the United Kingdom on or around the 5th of January, since the 15th Century. Most of us had a break from school and work at least for a few days during the holidays, and while rare, many years ago, farmers actually had a few days off during the holidays as well! After a short break, the farmers would get back to work, and get back to their ploughs, but not without one more important celebration of their own!

On Plough Monday, farmers in England and East Anglia would haul a decorated plough from the farm, door to door (which could sometimes be very far apart), and collect money at each farm or home they visited. There were always musicians alongside the plough, "Molly Dancers" (farmhands who would dance around for money), an old hunched-over woman who would be called "Bessy," and an old man who would play the role of the "fool" along the way (dressed in animal skins). This tradition is said to get the farmer's moving again for the new year of farming, and of course, was followed by "Plough Pudding" which originated in Norfolk, England, and contains meat, onions, and suet (animal fat).

Since "Plough Monday" means pick up your plough and get back to work, it looks like we should do the same! Let's get our "ploughs" ready, have a New Year celebration of our own, and then get movin'!
