Policy Highlight of the Month

4-H Program Policy and Information Update:

4-H Volunteers provide amazing experiences for 4-H Youth. Your contributions to the program are immeasurable and the value you bring is priceless. To that end, it's important to continue to provide and offer youth meaningful and engaging experiences that enhance their development and reinforce the ideals of 4-H. One way to do that is to offer volunteers training and professional development in areas that build competency in positive youth development – the foundation for the 4-H program – and content.

Two years ago, we developed the Volunteer Leaders' Training Series. The training is four sessions (8 hours of professional development training sessions offered every program year). The sessions are designed to equip volunteers with the most recent and effective strategies for engaging youth (Tools of the Trade); offer content specific experiences (Power of the Wind, Robotics); positive citizenship; healthy living; and on positive youth development (Step it Up to Thrive). During the current program year, we will offer training in each of the program mission mandates as well as one on positive youth development (Thrive). The training dates are:

Los Angeles County 4-H presents the... Grow Your Club Competition and Most Innovative Outreach Plan Competition!

Help the Los Angeles County 4-H Program grow! Los Angeles County 4-H has been awarded a special grant from the California 4-H Foundation earmarked for marketing and outreach. These funds will assist us in proceeding with an established five year overall marketing plan. There are two exciting new opportunities for youth to work individually, or as a club team, to develop innovative outreach strategies and grow their club at the same time!

Grow Your Club Competition

Every club in Los Angeles County 4-H is invited to participate in the *Grow Your Club Competition* by creating club advertisements, through word of mouth, participating in planned speaking engagements, designing and distributing fliers, hosting club "open house" events, and employing creative outreach strategies of their own.

First Place will go to clubs who increase their membership by 20% (no matter what the club size). Winning clubs (and there can be more than one) will receive a club pizza party and a 4-H Mall shopping spree for \$200.

Second Place will go to clubs who increase their membership by 10%. Winning clubs will receive a club pizza party.

Have you seen "Clover Safe Notes?"

September is *National Honey Month* and September 19-25 is *National Farm Safety and Health Week*. In 4-H, many of us work on or around farm-like settings, and we certainly work with animals big and small, on a regular basis. California 4-H has developed "Clover Safe Notes" for various projects that will provide best practices in a variety of project areas and settings.

Most of us involved in Equine Projects are familiar with best practices involving helmets and other safety requirements for working with horses, but did you ever wonder how to operate a tractor safely? Use pliers safely while working with bailing wire? A power saw? Safely transport medium and large animals? What would you do if you ran into a black bear? What if you or someone you know had a poisonous snake bite? All of these questions and more are answered with the **California 4-H Safe Clover Notes** available to you at:

• **Hello, Honey!**Dawn Fuller, 4-H Program Coordinator



At one time or another, we probably have all had a steaming cup of our favorite tea with honey or a warm biscuit slathered with a sweet gooey honey. September is **National Honey Month** and is a wonderful month for celebrating the delightful treat, along with the beekeepers that collect honey and the impressive insects that provide us with this natural sweetener, the bees.

Without bees, we wouldn't have honey. Without bees, many flowers wouldn't be pollinated (with the help of our fine feathered friends, birds). Without beekeepers, we wouldn't be able to enjoy this sweetly divine syrup.

Bees make honey in beehives after traveling near and far (at times up to 55,000 miles, jointly) to visit flowers and collect nectar. An individual bee may travel six miles, at fifteen miles per hour. A beehive may have up to 60,000 bees in a hive, and, as a group, the bees may visit two million flowers to create only a pound of honey! The *National Honey Board* Website tells us this:

"As bees travel from blossom to blossom in search of nectar, they brush against the pollen-bearing parts of a flower (anther or stamen) and pick up pollen. When the honey bee goes to another flower for more food, some of the pollen from the first flower sticks to the second flower. In this way, the flowers are pollinated. Almonds, apples, avocados, blueberries, cantaloupes, cherries, cranberries, cucumbers, sunflowers, watermelon and many other crops all benefit from honey bees for pollination."



Once the bees return to their hive from their hideously long nectar collecting journey, the "Worker Bees" start adding enzymes to the floral nectar and voilà-- HONEY! Depending on which sorts of flowers the "Bee Team" has visited, this determines the specific type of honey they create. In the United States there are over 300 kinds of honey, which differ not only in taste but in color.

Beekeepers keep bees to harvest their honey (and other byproducts such as honeycombs, beeswax, and royal jelly), to pollinate crops, or raise bees to eventually sell. They usually wear protective clothing covering their face and neck-- which is made of a light-colored material (makes the bees less likely to go into "fight mode."). Beekeepers sometimes use "Smokers" (a smoke emitting machine) which calms the bees and makes them feel hungry. When the bees smell the smoke, they worry that their home might be on fire, so they feel like they should "eat up" before their food is gone. Bees eat some of their own honey, which temporarily makes their "stingers" inactive. During this time, the beekeepers can work with the hive and feel a bit safer. On a small scale, the beekeeper can then remove the honeycomb from the hive, extract the honey, filter it, pour it out and preserve it, or process it in a variety of ways. Without beekeepers, we may have never had the chance to try this liquid gold!

The most common kind of honey (what you usually find in the grocery store) is *Clover Honey*. Most people buy honey that tastes good to them, and color doesn't play a big role in their selection. On the average, the lighter the honey, the sweeter the taste. Darker honeys are said to have a stronger taste, which some may prefer.



For those of you who have attended the Los Angeles County 4-H Pet Symposium, you may remember a special booth that the *Los Angeles County Beekeepers Association* hosted with a "live" bee display. The Los Angeles County Beekeepers Association taught us all a lot at this event and continue to host informational bee and honey events in and around Los Angeles. Local Farmer's Markets are a delightful place to try out different types of honey.

If you really want to learn about bees and honey, you need not look any further than Los Angeles County 4-H! The *Palos Verdes Peninsula 4-H Club* and the *Alta-Pasa Squad 4-H Club* have both hosted Beekeeping Projects and are open to members from clubs around the county. **Dee Keese**, of the PVP 4-H Club provided information, and the Alta-Pasa Squad 4-H Club Beekeeping Project Members were featured in a 2009 documentary called "The Vanishing of the Bees"

• Beekeeper's Honey Cake

Let's celebrate National Honey Month with a special "Beekeeper's Honey Cake!"

Beekeeper's Honey Cake

INGREDIENTS

2 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon ground cloves

2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

3/4 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

3/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

3/4 teaspoon baking soda

1/4 teaspoon salt

6 tablespoons (3/4 stick) unsalted butter, melted

1 1/2 tablespoons canola or corn oil

3 tablespoons packed dark brown sugar

1 tablespoon granulated sugar

3 large eggs, beaten

1 1/2 cups wildflower or other medium-colored honey

1 cup sour cream

1 cup dried cranberries or sour cherries

1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans

Sliced almonds for garnish

PROCEDURE

- 1. Preheat oven to 350F. Grease and flour a 12-cup Bundt or 10-inch tube pan, tapping out the excess flour, and set aside.
- 2. Sift together the flour, spices, cream of tartar, baking soda, and salt in a medium-size mixing bowl.
- 3. With an electric mixer, beat together the melted butter, oil, and both sugars in a large mixing bowl until well blended.
- 4. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, then add the honey and sour cream all at once. Beat until you have a smooth batter.
- 5. Beat in the flour mixture, 1 cup at a time, beating well after each addition.
- 6. Fold in the cranberries and walnuts. Pour the batter into the prepared cake pan.
- 7. Bake the cake until a cake tester inserted near the center comes out clean, 45 to 50 minutes.
- 8. Invert the cake onto a wire rack and let cool. As soon as the cake is cool enough to handle, press the flaked almonds into the top.
- 9. Place the cooled cake in an airtight container to ripen for 2 days before serving.
