Policy

4-H Policy and Information Update September, 2013

Recently, some parents have inquired about the University's photo release policy. The University of California 4-H Youth Development Program has always maintained a policy where parents (and youth for that matter) can ask to have a photo removed from any UC publication and UC owned website. The University takes very seriously the privacy consideration of parents and will honor any request to have pictures of themselves or youth removed. Having said that, please keep in mind that is it practically impossible to have an opt out option for families. Here are three examples to highlight the difficulty in having one:

Scenario 1:

Camp staff take over a yearly picture of over 150 campers and that is put on the county website. Since we do not know all 200 youth we are not able to verify which youth did and which did not sign the photo release (identifying each and every youth to ensure we have a photo release, and then photo shopping the youth out whose parent's did not sign it would be extremely time consuming.

Scenario 2:

Pictures of youth are taken at presentation day and then a family sends the picture to the county office but it has some other youth in the background and we don't know the names of the youth so we can't check to see if they signed a photo release.

Scenario 3:

There are 400-500 youth at State Leadership Conference, and we have pictures being posted on our Facebook page (which is monitored by 4-H state office staff), website, and afterglow from the event - we would not be able to use any of these if we had an opt out option because we would not know the names of the youth to be able to use any of the photos. Youth are not self-identified in pictures used for these purposes.

As you can see, because youth are not self-identified in most pictures, having an opt out option will be too difficult to manage. Again, if you see a picture of your child or children in any UC publication or on any UC owned website and you do not want it published please contact the County office and will work to have it promptly removed.

Voting at County Council meetings


Last May the LA County 4-H Leaders' Council approved updates to their Constitution and Bylaws. When these new bylaws come into effect, voting will be done differently at county council meetings. According to the new bylaws, "Voting privileges shall be extended to two (2) votes per club with one vote per active (council) member present at the meeting."

Clubs should decide how they want their club represented at county council meetings. The clubs could elect their representatives or just allow any two attending members vote for their club at the meetings or some other variation. If more than two from a club attend, the club should establish how that situation should be handled so there is no confusion at the meeting.

At this time, the updated LA County 4-H Leaders' Council Constitution and Bylaws has been approved by the county council and the LA County 4-H Office and is awaiting the approval of the state 4-H office.

• Record Books - What Are They?

In the 4-H Youth Development Program, there are many long-standing traditions. We may not know why we do them, or where they came from. 4-H youth members are encouraged to keep written records and documentation of their events and activities and submit them annually with a special green cover that says, "Member Record." For those new leaders and members, you might be wondering some of the following:

What is a Record Book?

4-H Record Books are an important form of keeping a written record/summary throughout the year of project work, events and activities, community service and overall learning and participation in the 4-H Youth Development Program. They are submitted for judging and competition at the Club, County level, and sometimes at the state level.

Why do a Record Book?

Record Books are a great way for members to reflect on what they have learned in many areas of their 4-H experience. It makes us look back on the year and say, "Hey! Look at all I have accomplished!" Over the years, our record books give us an extensive full picture of commitment, achievement, and success in a job well done. Completing a Record Book also helps teach us:

- o Personal skills in financial management
- o Personal accountability
- Record useful information
- o Preserve our fun memories of our 4-H experience
- o Provides a tool to share with others
- o Helps us plan what we would like to do/accomplish in the next year
- o Learn about planning and goal setting
- o Learn how to document in a complete manner
- Will be a great tool when applying for college, jobs or scholarships

When do I start my Record Book?

You should start keeping your records at the beginning of each 4-H year (July 1-June 30) and continue to do so all year long.

Where can I get a Record Book cover?

- You can also use your own plain, 2-pronged cover (ACCO) which you can find at a nearby stationery store.

What are the key elements in a Record Book?

- o Personal Development Report
- o 4-H Story
- o Project Record Report (for each project you are enrolled in)
- o Supplemental Materials (photos, newspaper articles, SET Activities, etc.)

What are some Helpful Hints for a Good Record Book?

- o Make sure to visit the State 4-H Website to view requirements and download forms at: http://www.ca4h.org/Resources/Members/RecordBook/RBResources/.
- o Include photos of you doing what you have mentioned in your Record Book.
- o Write captions under the photos explaining what you are doing.
- o Write as neatly as you can--typing would be even better!
- o Document club and project events right after they occur so that they will be fresh in your mind.
- o Include a title page, table of contents and tabs if you really want to impress the judges!

Can Primary Members (members age 5-8) turn in a Record Book?

Yes, to their Community Club Leader. Included in a Primary Record Book should be:

- o A Primary Personal Development Report
- o A Project Report Form for a Primary Project (listing the things they were involved in)

*Primary Record Books do not compete at the County level, as Primary competition is prohibited. They are only reviewed by the Community Club Leader. Primary Record Books are a great tool in which to start the practice of keeping records.

When are Record Books due?

Record Books are due to the County Office on **Tuesday, September 10, 2013**, by **4 p.m.** or by **9 p.m.** to an Incentives & Recognition Committee Member on **Wednesday, September 11, 2013**.

Can I turn in a Record Book On-Line?

Yes, for the **State** Record Book Competition, but not for County. However, you can complete the online record book forms, print them out, add any necessary Los Angeles County 4-H supplemental forms required for competition, and then submit for county competition. Go here to complete an on-line record book or to find out more information: https://ucanr.org/4hbook/login.cfm. When you go to this link you will be asked to submit your username and password, which are the same ones that you use for the 4-H Online Enrollment System.

For those youth who are completing an Online Record Book, and may have questions along the way, you can contact the LA County 4-H Online Record Book Resource Leader and San Fernando Valley 4-H Co-Community Club Leader, Teresa Fint, by email at teresa@fint.net.

How do I compete on the state level with my Record Book?

It is not necessary to turn your book in to the County first, but it is a good practice. The Los Angeles County Incentives and Recognition Committee will review your book for you and provide suggestions if you turn it in to them by October 26th. You must be a Senior 4-H Member (14-19 as of January 1, 2013). State Record Books must include:

- o Personal Development Report
- o 4-H Story
- o Project Report (for each project you are enrolled in)
- o Supplemental Materials (including photos, newspaper articles, SET Activities, etc.)
- o Junior Teen Leadership Report

Senior (State) Record Books should demonstrate outstanding achievement in:

- o Project Work
- Life Skills Development
- o Leadership & Citizen Development

We hope to see many wonderful Record Books turned in this year and see all that you have accomplished, as well as the fun you have had this program year. If your Mom and Dad were in 4-H, maybe they still have their Record Books for you to peruse. Keeping records and putting together your Record Books are a very important part of the 4-H Program, and how proud you will feel when it is all done!

"NEW" Record Book Manual

2013 LA County Record Book competition

The county record book competition will be run much like last year. Seniors should plan to submit their records on the forms from the new Record Book Manual 2011-2013. Due to the lateness of the coming out of the new record book manual, Juniors and Intermediates will be allowed to use the 2011 record book manual forms, but should expect to use the new forms next year. The 4-H program year ended June 30. Your current record books should contain your records up to that time.

• State Record Book Competition

Senior 4-H members are eligible to enter the state record book competition. State competition is focused on selecting 4-H members who have demonstrated outstanding achievement in their 4-H project work. Books are judged against standard criteria. Those books displaying the most outstanding 4-H work, life skills development, and leadership and citizenship development are selected as state medalists and/or state winners. Senior 4-H members (at least 14 years of age and no older than 19 years old by December 31 of the program year for which the book is being entered) are eligible to enter state competition. As awards,

- All 4-H members entering a record book at the state competition will receive constructive feedback.
- State participation and merit recognition members receive a certificate.
- State winners and medalists receive a certificate and lapel pin.
- All books submitted using the 4-H Online Record Book (ORB) receive a "Got ORB" T-shirt.

You don't need to enter the county record book competition to be able to enter the state record book competition, but it probably helps. Information about this year's state record book competition is still not available. Watch for information to come out on the state website and on our county website. This year senior members will need to complete an online course on state record books before they can submit their records to the state competition. Your records for the state record book competition will be due to the LA County 4-H office on October 25th, 2013.

Club Representatives for County Record Book Judging

REMINDER – If a club submits record books to the county Record Book competition, then the club needs to provide a judge for one of the Record Book judging days, September 21 or September 28. The judging again this year will be held at Good Shepherd Lutheran School/Church (6338 N. Figueroa St., LA, 90042). Judging record books is a good way to learn about record books for your club. No experience in judging is required. There is an orientation for judging at the start of each judging day. A club can only have up to three club representatives for judging, Judges do not judge record books from their own club. • LA County 4-H Officer Book Gold Medal

Did you do a great job as a club officer last year? If so, be sure to submit a 2012-2013 Officer Book for the officer book recognition program. The information and forms for the 2013 Officer Book Recognition Program are on the county website under APPLICATIONS. The evaluation of the officer records is done with the Danish system of judging so all officers have a chance to earn a Gold medal for their officer work. 2012-2013 Officer books are due at the same time as 2013-2013 record books, September 10 to the 4-H Office or by September 11 to an Incentives and Recognition Committee member (Noel Keller, Judylynn Pelling, Carrie DeYoung, Peter Michel).

Club Healthy Living Officer



• Father Hidalgo's Revolution




Mexican Independence Day is quickly approaching – no, not Cinco de Mayo – the actual **Mexican Independence Day**, **September 16**. Although many of us have been celebrating "Mexican Independence Day" grandly with good food, traditional music, lively dancing and all-around merrymaking on Cinco de Mayo, most of us don't know what we are really celebrating. Cinco de Mayo is actually a celebration of Mexico's glorious and hard-earned victory over the French in 1862, at the *Battle of Puebla* (also known as *Battala de Puebla*). The celebration of the *Battle of Puebla* has become on occasion for celebrating all things Mexican - which is great fun and a good reason to celebrate - but September 16 is an even better reason to celebrate with gusto.



September 16, often referred to as *The Cry of Independence (Grito de la Indepencia* or *El Dieciseis de Septiembre*) kicks off a month-long celebration of victories. The 16th of September is to Mexican citizens in Mexico and abroad (and many resident Mexican-Americans) what the 4th of July is to us here in the United States. Celebrations begin in earnest each year on the night of September 15 and include all of the usual fare we see on Cinco de Mayo, but with more feeling, flair, and even include large impressive and beautiful firework displays.

In 1810, Spain ruled Mexico with a controlling hand (limiting trade, forcing native citizens into slavery and misusing funds, thus leaving most citizens in severe poverty). As with most famous exciting fight-for-independence-battle stories, there is usually a fearless leader who ignites a fiery revolution of the "everyman" to rise up against a bitter common enemy who unfortunately, often meet an honorable but tragic end. In the case of Mexico's quest for freedom and dignity against its cruel Spanish rulers, in the eyes of Mexicans, this hero was Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla (often referred to as the "Father of Mexico").



Father Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla had followed his brother's footsteps and moved to the small town of Dolores, Mexico, where he became a respected theologian and a beloved parish priest. He spent his days studying biblical texts and working with the local peasant and indigenous population. During this period his ire and disdain towards Spanish rulers grew until he felt something drastic had to be done.

Enter Ignacio Allende -- a Mexican-born soldier for the Spanish Army. Allende was an underground conspirator in the fight for Mexican freedom and secretly helped arrange and plan multiple surprise attacks against Spanish rulers, with the biggest being scheduled for December of 1810. The secret attack plans were discovered beforehand, and with Allende and his co-conspirators likely capture, imprisonment and deaths imminent, they fled to Dolores, Mexico.



On September 16, 1810, in the pre-dawn light, Father Hidalgo (who was in his fifties at the time) gathered parish members in his tiny church in Dolores, Mexico. With on-the-run-Allende and his cohorts also present, and without saying a word, Father Hidalgo climbed the winding church stairs to the adobe steeple where he enthusiastically sounded the church bell as a "wake-up call" of sorts. It was then that Father Hidalgo gave a spine tingling speech that rallied and incited not only the parishioners, but Mexicans everywhere, to rise up against the Spanish. This famous speech would eventually become known as "El Grito de Dolores" (the "Cry of Dolores") and was the catalyst for the fight for Mexican Independence.

On September 10, 1810, Father Hidalgo and his new friend, Ignacio Allende, led an emotional and fed-up crowd of several thousand to the mining town of Guanajuato, Mexico, where they battled the residing Spanish and won. In October of the same year, Father Hidalgo, with Allende at his side, rallied an emotionally-charged crowd of 80,000 impoverished Mexican citizens and together started on the warpath to Mexico City. Citizens in towns along the way watched with fear and fascination as the mob of 80,000 fought and killed 1,500 Spanish soldiers, which became known as the *Battle of Monte de la Cruces*. Although they had almost made it to Mexico City, the decision for Father Hidalgo to retreat to Guadalajara, and Allende to Guanajuato, is still a much debated mystery. Many historians seem to feel that Father Hidalgo and Allende disagreed greatly on how the war should be waged and decided to part ways immediately. Surprisingly, Father Hidalgo was a "by any means necessary" sort of fellow, and Allende wanted to stick to the "rules of engagement" (whatever those may have been in those times).



Mere disagreements quickly boiled over into a great hatred for one another. After a failed attempt at poisoning Father Hidalgo and after losing the *Battle of Calderon Bridge*, Allende converted the soldiers to his way of thinking and had Father Hidalgo arrested. This was to prove an exercise in futility, as not long after Father Hidalgos' short lived imprisonment, both were captured by the Spaniards and promptly done away with.

The successors of the battle for independence carried on the torch ignited by Father Hildago and "El Grito de Dolores." Eleven long arduous years later, and after a defection of the Spanish Army in 1821, Mexico won its long desired independence. On Cinco de Mayo this year, we will celebrate Mexico winning the *Battle of Puebla* over the French, but on **September 16**, we will really celebrate Mexico's true independence.

A Mariachi Story

Living in Southern California - and more specifically in culturally diverse Los Angeles - we have many opportunities to celebrate special events and occasions in distinctive ways that honor long-standing traditions unique to these various cultures. With **Mexican Independence Day** approaching on **September 16**, you won't have to look farther than *Placita Olvera* (Olvera Plaza located on Olvera Street) to find a customary and festive place to celebrate. Everyone is invited to enjoy Mexico's Independence Day by tasting traditional foods such as tamales, enchiladas, tortas, street tacos, flan and more on Olvera Street. On Olvera Street, a visitor can expect to see beautiful brightly colored hand-sewn costumes and hear wonderful historic folk music played by mariachis on a variety of string and brass instruments that will make you want to get up and dance.



In the 4-H Program, we know that there isn't anything a youth member can't do, as long as he or she do their very best. If boys want to cook and sew -- great! If girls want to raise a heifer or rope and ride -- awesome! In 4-H, we all try to "Make the Best Better" and "Learn by Doing" in projects that we have an interest in. At the UC Cooperative Extension, of which LA County 4-H is a part, there is a perfect example of someone who tried her hand at something new, thus igniting her "spark." **Cynthia Avila** is the *Expanded Food Nutrition Education's Youth Program Coordinator (EFNEP)* for the Los Angeles Cooperative Extension, and in her free time, a mariachi in East LA!



Cynthia was born in 1977 in Ensenada and moved to East LA at the age of nine, where her Sonora-born father began singing and playing mariachi songs for his family on his guitar -- and especially his favorite song "Albur de Amor." Cynthia's father encouraged Cynthia to sing along while he practiced and even recorded the songs. Cynthia remembers trying to memorize the songs her father played and watching him with amazement. Cynthia's genuine interest and eventual love of mariachi music was further ignited by the fact that her family lived directly across the street from *El Mercadito* (a well-loved East LA marketplace with restaurants and live mariachi music). While Cynthia and her brothers and sisters played outside on the patio, she would often look across the street to see the mariachis practicing, or taking a break from a set, in their traditional costumes and fingering their shiny instruments. Between her father's shared love of mariachi music and the intriguing and mysterious mariachis of *El Mercadito*, Cynthia was hooked.

"My father was an inspiration to me. He gave me my love of Mariachi. He was, and IS, one of the best guitar players I have ever heard. I am so thankful for the gift that he gave me."



In 1990 when Cynthia reached junior high, she was surprised and excited to hear that one of the music teachers at Belvedere Junior High School pioneered a special elective "Mariachi Class." Mr. Adolfo Martinez had the goal of teaching his students the traditional music of Mexico and also hoped that during this process, the students would develop a true love and respect for their culture and a burning desire to keep tradition alive. A lucky coincidental mix-up with Cynthia's school schedule placed her in Mr. Martinez's class. It was destiny!

In Mr. Martinez's Mariachi Class, Cynthia learned how to memorize music (mariachi do not use sheet music), sing, and play a violin in an orchestra. The students in the class learned how to play Sones, Rancheras, Huapangos, Polkas and a great many other mariachi styles. Cynthia's Mariachi Class was comprised of six boys and six girls who would eventually become a very important part of Cynthia's life.

"Everyone in the class was required to learn a string or brass instrument and to sing in a group and perform solos. You could choose your instrument - violin, trumpet, guitarrón (a special large Mexican guitar), guitar, harp and vihuela (guitar-like instrument). I chose the violin."

Mr. Martinez's mariachi students were popular with the students and staff at Belvedere Junior High School, and word started to spread into the larger community about the young mariachis who were thrilling people when playing "El Son de la Negra" (The Black Train), "Laureles" (Laurels) and more. It didn't take long for Mr. Martinez's class to be invited to play events and festivals all over Los Angeles.



Cynthia spent many long hours at home practicing singing and playing her violin while her father listened. She tried to emulate greats like Lucha Reyes, Lucha Villa, Lola Beltran and even Linda Ronstadt. Her free time spent practicing was her own choice. When she practiced in her East LA home, she would imagine herself playing sold-out concerts at the Rose Bowl and the esteemed Mariachi U.S.A. Concert (Hollywood Bowl). Cynthia longed to make her family, and most importantly, her father proud. She dreamed of her father watching her in a crowd of thousands with a tear in his eye and a smile on his face.

"The songs written for women singers have a special spark to them that excites me. One of my very favorites is 'La Charreada.' It talks about festive traditional gatherings at Mexican rodeos with bull riding, roping and riding, and mariachis performing alongside the entire time. It makes me happy when I sing it and reminds me of good times in my childhood in Ensenada, Mexico, at rodeos."

When Cynthia's class moved on to high school in 1993, the students of Mr. Martinez's class may not have all been at the same school, but they still saw each other regularly to play the music together that they had grown to love. They formed a mariachi group that would be named "Alma de mí Tierra" (Soul of My Land). Alma de mí Tierra started to get requests to play for birthdays, baptisms, weddings, quinceañeras and family parties. Cynthia and the members of Alma de mí Tierra were stunned to find that people would pay them \$45 an hour to play at these events and the young mariachis pooled the money to buy matching "Trajes Suits" (traditional mariachi wear). Cynthia remembers being very proud to wear her blue and beige suede suit (purchased with money that she and her fellow mariachis eagerly earned for doing something they all enjoyed). Eventually, they were able to save enough money from their earnings to purchase a shared van to travel to and from performances. Alma de mí Tierra was then invited to play regular gigs on Sundays at Placita Olvera (a big deal for a group of fledging mariachis). It was at one such performance at Placita Olvera that a popular mariachi group from La Fonda Restaurant, Mariachi los Camperos, got the idea to adopt the young group and pass their years of experience on to the younger generation of mariachis.



Under the tutelage of *Mariachi los Camperos*, the group soared in popularity and requests for performances poured in. With the added performances, they were able to keep up maintenance of the van and buy more expensive and decorative mariachi costumes. The group was invited to play at festivals and events statewide in San Jose, Arizona, and Alaska. *Alma de mí Tierra* were chuffed to be invited to play with other prominent mariachis from Croatia, Cuba, Italy, Belgium, Chile, France, Argentina, Panama, Japan, Ecuador, Colombia, Australia, Venezuela, Aruba, Costa Rica, Canada and the United States in the Primer Encuentro de Mariachis y Charreada (First Mariachi Conference and Rodeo) in Guadalajara, Mexico. This year, we mark the 20th Encuentro de Mariachis y Charreada in Guadalajara, Mexico.



It seemed nothing could stop *Alma de mí Tierra*, but then the group members started to graduate and grow up. After high school in 1997, Cynthia attended East LA College. When she did have free time she would play weekends and special events with a newly formed group called *Estrellas de Oro y Plata* (Gold and Silver Stars). Cynthia was often the only female singer in the all-male group. It was at a Sunday afternoon performance of *Estrellas de Oro y Plata* at *7 Mares Restaurant* in Pomona, California, where Cynthia was playing the violin and singing, when she was asked by a gentleman's sister to sing "Las Mañanitas" for his special day (Happy Birthday). Oscar Avila was so pleased with his birthday serenade (and by the way, it wasn't actually his birthday; he just thought Cynthia was fantastic) that he would frequent the restaurant weekly. They were married a short time after and now have two lovely children.



With being a new wife and mother, attending school to obtain a Master's Degree in Business Administration and working full-time as a Nutrition Educator at the UC Cooperative Extension, there wasn't a lot of time for Cynthia to pursue her love of performing mariachi music. Life continued. In recent times, Cynthia received her master's degree, the kids have grown a bit, and with her husband, her father, friends' and family's backing, Cynthia has formed a new mariachi group called "Mariachi Urupan" (Urupan is a city in the state of Michoacan, Mexico). Cynthia is the only female singer in the all-male group, and she couldn't be happier. Recently, esteemed mariachis from all over the world convened to attempt to break a Guinness World Record at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, California, for the most mariachis playing together at one time. Cynthia is proud to report that 566 mariachis serenaded thousands and broke the record.

Cynthia and *Mariachi Urupan* play weekends at various locations around Los Angeles County and plan to give a fantastic performance on **September 16**, **Mexican Independence Day**, at her old stomping grounds – Placita Olvera. At the celebration she plans to play and sing some of her most beloved songs - "Son de la Negra" (The Black Train) and "Cielito Lindo" (Pretty Sky). Cynthia has a message for 4-H youth which she shared with me:

"Mariachi is for everyone. It's tradition. It's played and enjoyed by many DIFFERENT cultures. So if you already play a string or brass instrument, you are already halfway to becoming a mariachi! If you do your best and play with your heart, you can become a mariachi just like me."

California Style Chicken Street Tacos (http://thecozyabode.com/california-style-chicken-street-tacos/)



How about making **California Style Chicken Street Tacos** provided by *The Cozy Abobe* for your **Mexican Independence Day** celebration?

Ingredients

- •1 lb boneless skinless chicken breasts, chopped into small pieces
- •½ tsp salt
- •1 tsp chili powder
- •1 tsp cumin
- •¼ tsp garlic powder
- •1/4 tsp onion powder
- •1 small bunch radishes, sliced thin
- •1 bunch cilantro, minced
- •4 oz gueso fresco cheese (use feta if you can't find it)
- •2 limes
- •6 small corn tortillas
- •1 T canola oil
- •salsa

Instructions

- 1. Heat the oil over medium high heat. When hot, add the chicken and cook for about eight minutes, or until chicken has cooked through. Season with salt, chili powder, cumin garlic powder and onion powder.
- 2. Heat another skillet and add the corn tortillas, one by one, to warm up. Alternatively, you can place the tortillas on a plate, cover with a damp paper towel, and microwave for approximately a minute until very hot.
- 3. Once warm, fill tortillas with a little chicken, some chopped cilantro, sliced radishes, a little cheese and a big squeeze of lime. Serve with additional toppings and salsa if desired.

You don't have to attend Hi 4-H meetings to attend the special Hi 4-H events. This year 13 year olds are again invited to attend Hi 4-H activities as guests.

The sectional level Hi 4-H is called the Sectional Teen Council. It meets before sectional 4-H Leaders' Council meetings at Mt. SAC. The Teen Council plans social and educational events, plus runs the T.I.C. conference in January and a food booth at sectional field day in May. Our senior members can be part of the Teen Council. Our senior members can attend their events. Consider being more active on the sectional level. The county level Hi 4-H program will only exist if there is sufficient interest this year. • Junior/Teen Leader

Junior Leaders are 4-H members in the 7th and 8th grade who help lead a 4-H project. Teen Leaders are 4-H members in 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th and above grades who lead a 4-H project. To be a Junior/Teen Leader, the member needs to be enrolled in their club's Leadership Project. They fill out the goals and plans of the first two sections of the Leadership Plan and Report Form, and have the form signed by their Leadership Project Leader and the leader of the project for which they will be a youth leader. While they are a Junior or Teen Leader, they can wear the Junior or Teen Leader patch on their 4-H hat. At the end of the year, they will need to complete the Leadership Plan and Report and have it signed by their Leadership Project Leader and their project leader. They should also complete an Annual Project Report for the Leadership Project.

• Be a 4-H All-Star

All-Star is the highest rank that a 4-H member can achieve at the County level. The All-Star award affords 4-H members the opportunity to further develop their leadership skills on a countywide basis. Each year Los Angeles County selects several 4-H members who have applied and are deserving of this rank to become All-Stars. The Los Angeles County 4-H Program expects its All-Stars to contribute to the 4-H Program during the next program year.
