WARM SEASON GARDENS FOR NAPA COUNTY

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Plant in late spring or early summer for late summer harvest. Seed of suggested plants can be planted indoors about 6 weeks before you want to plant them outdoors. These plants are injured by cold temperatures, so plant out of doors after danger of frost is past. Early plantings in April require extra measures such as 'hot caps' to protect and warm them. Seeds require soil temperatures of 70° to 85° F for rapid germination. Seeds planted into cold soil germinate slowly and are prone to attack by water molds. To reduce water mold 'damping-off', water seeds at planting, then let the soil surface dry while seedlings emerge. Water again when seedlings have four leaves or reach 3 inches tall. The listed plants can be repeat seeded from April through July to assure continuing harvest. Remember to 'rotate' crops from year to year into different garden locations to prevent build-up of insect and disease problems in the soil.
