4-H Policy and Information Update December 2014

As we approach the new year and reflect on the current year's accomplishments let us remember the value of the 4-H program has to the lives of 4-H members all throughout Los Angeles County. Through the 4-H program leaders have given amazing gifts to youth. They have given friendship, guidance, support, wisdom and yes, love. Taken together, these gifts represent providing a sense of belonging (one of the 4-H Essential Elements).

Researchers have determined that youth learn best when given the supports and opportunities to learn in a safe place and space. That is, the emotional and physical environment has to be a place where the well-being of youth matters and is validated by caring adults (belonging). The language used, the arrangement of the physical space and the activities offered validate youth (belonging). Belonging suggests that youth feel welcomed and that they are a part of something meaningful, supportive and safe. Belonging gives youth a sense of mutual commitment to an ideal of community that 4-H fosters.

Think about Belonging each time you engage a 4-H member in a project activity, help a youth prepare a speech or demonstration or welcome a new family to the program. Going forward into the new year, give special consideration to the essential element of belonging. Continue to make belonging an important part of the 4-H experience and give youth that sense of connection to something greater than themselves

LA County 4-H is proud to welcome its newest club – the **Beverly Hills Heart Helpers 4-H Club**. Community Club Leader, **Barbara Linder**, has a long history of service in the community and a strong passion for gardening, animals, leadership, and healthy living.

Barbara was raised in Beverly Hills where her father was a doctor and her mother was a housewife who passed on to her daughter a love of animals. As a child, Barbara's parents allowed her to raise the usual pets – cats, dogs, birds, turtles, and even toads. Barbara loved her family's pets, but also wanted to raise some that were not *allowed*. On several occasions, Barbara adopted guinea pigs without her mom's knowledge. She recalled running up the stairs with a baby guinea pig hidden under her coat - away from her mother's eyes. Barbara's mother just happened to be coming up the stairs at the same time, and when they ran into each other, the secreted guinea pig flew up in the air. In shock, Barbara's mother discovered a cage in Barbara's closet where she had been taking good care of not only another guinea pig, but a pet snake as well. Sadly, Barbara had to give away the guinea pig and was forced to take the pet snake with her to camp in Malibu where she released it into the wild.







Barbara went to law school and became an attorney. She sat next to a fine young gentleman in class who gave her a piece of gum each morning because he knew she liked it. She liked the gum, and she liked the boy. They were married in 1978 and raised two boys. Barbara passed on her own love of animals and passion for public service to both of her sons.

Later in life, Barbara took horticulture classes at UCLA. During the course of her studies, she heard about the UC Cooperative Extension, the Master Gardener Program, and more importantly, 4-H. She recalls hearing about 4-H in her youth, and until her coursework, didn't realize that 4-H could exist in an urban setting like Beverly Hills. Her path was set. She would start a 4-H club. She contacted the LA County 4-H Office, and the rest is history.

For the first time in a number of years, **Dee Keese**, Community Club Leader for the Palos Verdes Peninsula 4-H Club, along with **Nori Pearce**, Montana State University Lake County Agent, were able to bring back the beloved State-to-State 4-H Exchange. In preparation for the fair in Lake County, LA County 4-Hers learned how to wash and clip cattle. They worked with sheep, horses, chickens, and rabbits. At a sheep ranch in Charlo, Montana, 4-Hers learned how to sheer sheep and all about horse showmanship. A big highlight was attending a Native American Pow-Wow along with twenty different honorable tribes. Youth from Montana and LA County went horseback riding together, picked cherries, raspberries, and vegetables for shared meals.



As with all youth in the 4-H Program nationwide, a big part of the week was spent doing community service activities side-by-side. Along with Montana 4-H youth, LA County 4-H members hosted a special dinner for a local senior organization – the **Monte-Chato Women's Club**. At the *LA County 4-H Pet & Science Symposium*, Dr. Nathaniel led a "Rockets to the Rescue" science experiment for 4-H youth in honor of *National Youth Science Day*.



2014 was also a year of program change, outreach, and growth. While the club program remains the most popular mode of participation, LA County 4-H provided new and innovative opportunities for Los Angeles youth to engage in 4-H learning. 4-H "courses" in a variety of project areas were held in several locations throughout the Antelope Valley and Los Angeles. New partnerships were formed with the YMCA, the Department of LA County Parks and Recreation, culturally diverse summer youth programs, and several school districts throughout Los Angeles County. Over **1,339** Los Angeles youth outside of the club program were touched by 4-H in an engaging and meaningful way.



LA County 4-H formed a "Futures Taskforce" which was comprised of both 4-H volunteers and esteemed youth practitioners from all over the county. The *Futures Taskforce* met over the course of summer and fall to evaluate the effectiveness of our current volunteer structure with its merits and pitfalls, as well as roles and responsibilities. As a result, the *Futures Taskforce* is working towards outlining and implementing a new and improved Middle Management Volunteer Structure. It is our hope that the new structure will help streamline county events and activities, grow our volunteer base, and diversify the entire program. We are looking forward to a new year of positive change for the growing program.

Summer Camp was one of the best years yet with 20 adult chaperones and 125 youth from as far away as Arizona and Georgia. Many attendees remarked that the youth camp staff were exemplary leaders this year. New activities included archery, boat building, and orienteering. The **LA County 4-H Pet Symposium** has quickly become one of the favorite and most well-attended events in our program. This year, the Pet Symposium was held in coordination with a special celebration of *National Youth Science Day*. The *LA County 4-H Pet & Science Symposium* was held at Belvedere Park and 711 community members and 23 pet experts attended the enjoyable day. Mt. Sac provided a popular sheep shearing event for the first time ever and the LA County Department of Animal Care and Control provided all animal shots and chipping free of charge. There was face painting, pet rock decorating and adoption, free giveaways, and a wonderful County Awards Day Ceremony.

Where Did My Divider Labels Go?

Each year record books with missing divider labels are returned to members from the county record book judging. During the judging process, the record books are handled by several people and sometimes the title labels slip out of the divider label holder. Usually this happens when the label is a single layer. Double the label by folding two together and the extra thickness of the label and fiction will help hold the label in place.
