POLICY

4-H Policy and Information Update March 2015

The 4-H Youth Development Program has a responsibility to provide quality out-of-school experiences for youth who participate in activities. Staff, volunteers, youth and partners all have a role in ensuring that the 4-H environment is safe for all, but especially for youth members. All levels of programming regardless of venue should reflect a thorough review of safety procedures and plans for responding in case of an emergency.

In addition to physical safety, staff, members, volunteers and parents should feel emotionally safe during 4-H activities or at events that are 4-H sponsored. This includes camp, Field Day, Judging Day, and others. Moreover, with the exploding access and use of social media (i.e., text messaging, Facebook, Twitter), it is more imperative that we honor our program code of conduct and keep the safety and well-being of our members in mind. For example, when communicating with youth and their families in the name of 4-H, please be sure that the content is directly related to 4-H and is free of political, religious or other propaganda. If you feel that a staff, an adult volunteer or youth member has violated the 4-H Code of Conduct or has made you feel uncomfortable in person or via text, Facebook or other platform, please call the 4-H County Office immediately @ (323) 260-3845 or send an email to kcnathaniel@ucdavis.edu. Photography Project Macy 4-H Club, Communications Committee

Macy 4-H Photography Club is made up of a dozen boys and girls ranging from 6th to 8th grade with an honorary member in 5th grade. The main objective of the Photography Project to improve their skills in taking photos. During the week, the students are required to take pictures of things that interest them. When the group meets with the instructor, they usually edit photos that have been sent in by the members. An editing tool they have been using is the Wacom tablet.

The Wacom Tablets make editing photos easier than using a mouse or a touchpad. These tablets are flat surfaces with stylists that can control the cursor on the screen. For example, when using the stylist, it makes the changes to the photos more exact. Once the photos have been edited, the students can choose to keep the photo or delete it. Then they can start over with a new picture. While some students are practicing using the editing program and the Wacom tablets, the other 4-H members are outside taking pictures. These students hope that their time and effort will help them become better photographers, or maybe even win a 4-H competition!

Primary members may only participate in the PRIMARY CLINIC and PRIMARY CULTURAL ARTS. Extemporaneous Speaking and Problem Solving Presentations are only for seniors (9th grade and above).

Each club that has at least one youth participant in a Field Day activity must provide at least one adult to help run the event. Senior youth are also encouraged to apply to help. No prior experience is necessary. Submit the names and phone numbers of any 4-H adult or senior youth volunteers to Dee Keese at swimdude64@earthlink.net.

The 2015 topics/jobs for the Problem Solving Presentations, the State Format Impromptu Speaking and the Mock Interviews can be found on the county website under **EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES**.

This year there will be special recognition opportunities at State Field Day 2015 on May 30 for youth who participate at State 4-H Presentation Day and focus their presentations on one of the following areas: Science, Engineering & Technology, Healthy Living, Thrive or Citizenship. The recognition topics are Aerospace Engineering: Flying Into the Future; Sleep and Stress; The Path to Thriving; and Civic Engagement. All presentation formats are eligible, except impromptu speaking and problem solving categories. Participants may only choose one focus area for their presentations, and the area must be the primary topic of the presentation. Only members who receive a gold seal at a sectional event and compete at the State 4-H Presentation Day are eligible for special recognition. 4-H members must select a focus area when submitting the State Presentation Day Registration to be eligible for special recognition. Western Region Leaders Forum 2015 – Session Online Noel Keller, LA County 4-H Leaders' Council, President

This year the Western Region Leaders Forum (WRLF) 2015 was run by the Oregon State 4-H program. Instead of leaders and volunteers going to Oregon for the event, Oregon decided to send the sessions out to the leaders by webinars and online recordings. This is the first time this kind of format is being used for this Forum. The purpose of the Forum is to bring together leaders to learn and share new ideas for the 4-H program activities, plus to provide an opportunity for leaders to network. The WRLF 2015 was run as three consistency.

The first e-session was held on Tuesday, Jan. 27 with a theme of "Youth Connect: At Great Meetings". Ideas were presented on helping youth have fun at club meetings while learning, conducting business and practicin leadership.

The second e-session has held on Thursday, Feb. 12 with a theme of "Widening the Circle: Special Connections" Practice skills and gain confidence in working beside 4-H youth who have special needs.

The third e-session was held on Monday, Mar. 2 with a theme of "Youth Connecting: In Your Community". Gain ideas about how to include citizenship and community service in every 4-H club meeting.
