Policy

4-H Policy and Information Update November 2015

The University of California 4-H Youth Development Program is open to any and all youth without regard to race, gender, religion or sexual orientation. The Affirmative Action policy outlines and guides our program efforts to be sure the program is open and accessible to all who want to participate. 4-H does not and has never endorsed quotas or programming based on a quota system. However, each club should reflect the community in which it is situated and mirror the families and people who live there. Clubs that do not reflect the community should at least demonstrate *All Reasonable Effort* (ARE) to show earnest and genuine attempts to reach youth and families not reflected in the club. According to the policy, ARE includes:

- Using all appropriate available mass media, including radio, newspaper, and television, to inform potential clientele of the program and of the opportunity to participate.
- Distributing announcements, flyers, and posters, as appropriate.
- Sending circulars and personal letters to individuals who are members of the underserved clientele group, including the dates and places of meetings or other planned activities, and inviting them to participate.
- Making personal visits to a representative number of the underserved potential clientele in a geographically defined area to encourage them to participate.
- While volunteer leaders may be asked to assist in these efforts, ultimate responsibility for compliance rests with 4-H YDP staff.

• Macy 4-H Summer

Macy 4-H Club Communications Committee

A small group of Macy 4-H members came over the summer and helped maintain the garden. The students met from June to August on every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. The 4-H'ers worked at the Macy Intermediate garden from 8:00 to 11:00 am. Some tasks that were mandatory for them to do every day were to weed and water. It was more common for weeds to pop up because of the extreme heat. Watering was equally important because without it, the sun would bake the soil and dry the plants.

During summer break, the members turned the hard earth of the north plot into nutritious soft soil using shovels and a tiller. They used the tiller to loosen the soil that couldn't be done by hand. After the soil was loosened, it was mixed with fertilizer to make it rich in nutrients. Carrots, squash, broccoli, and other vegetables were seeded to prevent the plot from hardening. The plot was then divided into four sections so that the eighth graders could plant whatever they wanted. Macy 4-H members also transplanted five milkweeds into a smaller plot. The milkweeds were donated by one of our senior 4-H members for our on-going butterfly pavilion.

In the south plot, plants were grown using the Three Sisters Method. It is a technique that allows you to 2grow three specific plants at the same time while they benefit each other. Corn and squash were grown in the spring which allowed the beans to be planted during the summer.

During vacation, Macy 4-H members harvested the plants they had grown like the Armenian cucumbers and cherry tomatoes. At this time, the Macy 4-H group is growing fruits like berries and watermelons. They are also growing herbs such as basil, rosemary, and lavender. Roses and sunflowers are in the garden to make it more beautiful!

One of the improvements that took place over the summer was the trimming down of the succulents. The succulents were overpopulating the entire plot because they were too robust. Some of the plants were taken out of the ground, their branches were trimmed, and transplanted back into the soil. Unfortunately, most of the plants were thrown away, however it gave the young succulents a chance to continue growing.

One important aspect of gardening is composting. Plastic bins were purchased to store the worms and moist soil. Parts of food and paper were scattered about so that the worms could have food to eat. When the worms eat enough nutrients, their digested material becomes "worm tea". The worm tea is so potent that it must be diluted with water before it is directly sprayed or used in the garden. Therefore, it is extremely beneficial for the plants, because it is 100% organic.

The Macy 4-H also maintained the drought resistant area in front of the school. Growing plants were trimmed and invading weeds were pulled out. Workers from Matsunaga Landscapes added stone tiles to the pathway.

Over the summer, the Macy 4-H members were kept busy. They maintained the garden, continued the Three Sisters Method, and started a butterfly pavilion and worm bin. Although much progress has been made, there is more work to be done in autumn.

Macy 4-H Projects

Macy 4-H Communications Committee

Our club started three years ago. Since then we have grown in the number of members and projects. Originally, we started with Gardening and Film/Photography. Now, our Macy 4-H has a total of six projects. The six projects that we have are Greenspace, Photography, Communications, Rocketry, Leadership, and Fishing.

In Greenspace, we learn the basics of gardening such as weeding, watering, and transplanting. Whenever we meet, we always water and weed the plots. In addition to what we do at Greenspace, we feed the worms and turn the soil to help them produce worm tea. The worm tea is either used in our own garden or sold at the Farmer's Market. At this time, we are growing the Three Sisters, succulents, lamb's ear, and sunflowers. Watermelon, eggplants, artichokes, and carrots are some of the produce in our garden. We are also growing herbs such as lavender and rosemary.

In Photography, we take pictures and critique them with our APL (Adult Project Leader), Mr. Lazaro. Every Thursday, we bring the pictures that we have taken throughout the week. Then we sit as a group and discuss what we liked, disliked, and how the photographs can be improved. At the moment, we are preparing for the PTA photography competition by editing the photos we have chosen to submit. Then we will matte the pictures and turn them into the district office where they will be judged and placed according to certain criteria.

The Communications Project has been working on creating school bulletin boards and writing monthly 4-H articles. For the school bulletin board, they have taken pictures of the Macy garden and introduced the members of the 4-H Communications group. Our APL, Ms. Wong, helps us edit the articles and design the school bulletin boards.

In Rocketry, the students design rockets and launch them. They record the measurements to see how far the rockets travel. They spend most of their time learning about how a rocket is structured and how it works. The rockets are launched from a 2-liter soda bottle. It is propelled into the air when the pressure is released. Mr. Kelly is in charge of the Rocketry Project which meets every Wednesday.

Mrs. Chavira, a retired Macy teacher, is in charge of the Leadership Project. In this project, there are five student board members and six JPLs (Junior Project Leader). They are in charge of planning the next membership meeting or meet to work on record books for competitions. The Leadership Project meets every Monday to discuss record books. At the record book meetings, the leaders are taught how to properly complete 4-H activity sheets. The leaders also meet to inform the other members of what is currently going on in their club.

The Fishing Project is led by their APL, Mr. Lam. He has been teaching the group the basics of fishing such as casting and tying knots. Every third Saturday of the month, the students participate in a local fishing derby at Legg Lake, a nearby park. There, they compete against other anglers to see who can catch more fish. In the future, the group is planning to have an offshore fishing trip where they can practice their skills.

Throughout the years, Macy 4-H has grown from having two to having six successful projects. In each of these projects, students have the chance to learn special skills related to their club. Students are also given opportunities to develop leadership skills while enjoying what they do.
