Policy

4-H Policy and Information Update February 2016

The 4-H Youth Development Program has a responsibility to provide quality out-of-school experiences for youth who participate in activities. Staff, volunteers, youth and partners all have a role in ensuring that the 4-H environment is safe for all, but especially for youth members. All levels of programming regardless of venue should reflect a thorough review of safety procedures and plans for responding in case of an emergency.

In addition to physical safety, staff, members, volunteers and parents should feel emotionally safe during 4-H activities or at events that are 4-H sponsored. This includes camp, Field Day, Judging Day, and others. Moreover, with the exploding access and use of social media (i.e., text messaging, Facebook, Twitter), it is more imperative that we honor our program code of conduct and keep the safety and well-being of our members in mind. For example, when communicating with youth and their families in the name of 4-H, please be sure that the content is directly related to 4-H and is free of political, religious or other propaganda. If you feel that a staff, an adult volunteer or youth member has violated the 4-H Code of Conduct or has made you feel uncomfortable in person or via text, Facebook or other platform, please call the 4-H County Office immediately @ (626) 568-1970 or send an email to kcnathaniel@ucanr.edu. • 4-H Leadership Conference

Communications Committee, Macy 4-H Club

On January 30, 2016, eleven Macy 4-H members attended the leadership conference in San Pedro, California. The conference took place in a former Boy Scout meeting hall where only non-profit organizations could meet. While the club advisors met separately, any other club member that was interested in building their leadership skills could attend workshops. The workshops were about teamwork, organization, and time management. Other sessions included an overview of 4-H Record Books and the duties of the 4-H South Section Short Circuit Crew.

The first topic of discussion was teamwork. The students were divided into small groups to brainstorm qualities that a team player would possess. Most of the groups said that teamwork required communication, cooperation, and collaboration. Next, the members were given a task to incorporate the skills that they had listed. Each group was given a ping pong ball and every participant was handed a small piece of pipe that was cut in half. The challenge was to get the ping pong ball from one side of the room to the other side. Students had to form a path by overlapping the pipes, so that the ball could roll from one pipe to another. If the ball dropped, the team would have to start over. This activity taught the 4-H members the importance of having patience and to be open to other people's ideas.

Xavier Cruz, a senior member of Macy 4-H, informed the members about the responsibilities of the 4-H South Section Short Circuit Crew. He explained how to become a member of the group and shared his personal experiences. The Short Circuit Crew works exclusively with 4-H on anything tech related in the Southern California area. For example, they take photos wherever they go, they set up projectors and screens at events, and work with the audio equipment.

The third subject that the members covered was 4-H Record Books. Two senior members explained what record books were and showed the audience an example of their own. A record book is a way that helps 4-H members keep track of all the minutes they spend participating in 4-H meetings and activities.

The session on organization focused mainly on time management. The ambassadors showed the students how to efficiently organize their day, keeping a balance between their responsibilities and their free time. They emphasized that personal time is essential to everyone's life. It is important because it gives someone a chance to rest and reenergize themselves in order to be ready for the next day.

The leadership conference was a great opportunity for Macy 4-H members to get to know and work with other 4-H Clubs in Southern California. At the conference, students learned about teamwork and organization. They also reviewed the importance of organizing their activities in record books. The Macy 4-H participants enjoyed their time and would attend the conference again.

Interview with an Outstanding 4-H Project Leader – Wayne Wilson, Canyon Coyotes 4-H Drama Project Leader and Playwright Extraordinaire

Were you in 4-H in your youth?

No, I wasn't. I grew up in Indiana, where I assume 4-H was quite big, but it was not on our radar. I'm sure I had seen pictures of kids in green hats standing next to large animals, but that was about it. I really found about it when we moved to Acton, CA, which is a semi-rural part of L.A. County.

What led you to volunteer for 4-H?

Our children were home-schooled in their early years, and 4-H was big in our community, so we got involved. We appreciated the different projects, social interaction, and the volunteer leaders who were willing to share their interests and knowledge. Our kids chose a variety of projects that suited their individual interests, but we had all of them in Communications to learn public speaking and develop a comfort with presenting information. Two wonderful ladies ran the project at the time. As a side activity, I put together little skits to do at County Field Day. As those ladies moved on, I took over the leadership of the Communications project, and then developed the Drama project as something separate.

In your 13 years of volunteering for 4-H, has it always been with Canyon Coyotes 4-H Club?

Yes, with Canyon Coyotes from the beginning! As exciting as it is to perform at the Field Days, it is always a highlight for the kids to perform at our Canyon Coyotes leader's appreciation dinner in front of friends and the leaders of other projects they are in. It's a very enthusiastic audience, and the theme of the luncheon and décor usually match the play for that year.

Aside from drama, what other projects have you led for your club?

Just these two. Drama and Communications. As the pastor of a church, public speaking naturally seemed like something I could help project members with. But I also had some theatrical experience in High School, and I had a keen interest in making films since the sixth grade. I seem to be drawn to spoofing existing things. In High School I dragged all my acting friends into making an hour and a half musical comedy version of MacBeth on 8mm film. (How I would have loved the modern video cameras!). I had a long-standing desire to be a film-maker. Film school is what drew me to California. 4-H Drama lets me keep my hand in that world.

If you had to guess, how many youth over the years have been a part of the plays in the Drama Project?

That's hard to say since a number of kids stay with the project for years. I suppose about 50 – 60.

What is your favorite 4-H play?

Every year I ask myself that question, usually prompted by someone's asking that very thing. All the plays have their special moments and memories, along with things that didn't quite work out in execution. I will always have a warm feeling of affection for 4-H in Neverland (our take on Peter Pan) because we explored deeper emotions with that play than any of the others. I had a wonderful Peter and Wendy who were able to capture that emotion beautifully. They brought tears to my eyes.

I also have a fond memories of Shakespeare in 4-H. I'm a Shakespeare buff and enjoyed writing about a 4-H club inhabited by many of the Bard's most famous characters as children, such as Hamlet in the bee-keeping project ("Two bees or not two bees"). That play was largely dependent on the performances of the girls playing Regan and Goneril (the wicked sisters from King Lear). We happened to have two very talented gals who made those roles come alive. It was the last 4-H year for each of them. One went on to do some wonderful performances in community theater and is still acting. She always mentions her beginnings in 4-H drama.

Some other thoughts from Mr. Wilson...

There are two main features of my philosophy for running the Drama project. Sometimes they are in conflict. The first is to be excellent. We encourage hard work, and dedication. We shoot for the gold. I like that Share the Fun has a competitive dimension to it, because knowing we must compete against other clubs is motivation to work harder. We all like to win. At the same time, no one is ever turned away from performing in our project. Everyone who signs up for Drama gets a part and will be on stage performing. I write the plays according to the number of kids in the project. That can be a headache, but it is worth it. We have try-outs for parts, but not for being in the play. Everyone is in. This can hurt us in competition, of course, because some participants simply don't have natural acting abilities. Some will never speak quite loud enough or really understand timing. But over the course of the year, each child does grow in confidence and ability in some way, and for me, that has a golden luster all its' own. I hear that growth echoed in their comments when I read the yearbook descriptions of what being in Drama meant to them. Those comments are enormously satisfying to me.

It is also fun to see how drama intersects with other projects the kids are in. Fashion review and sewing projects have often overlapped with costumes for Drama. This year, our Snow White, Rebekah Kasperson, is making her own costume, and entering it at County Field Day. We have had a number of project members make their own outfits. Each of the lead girls I mentioned in Shakespeare in 4-H made spectacular Renaissance dresses. I was blown away!

Do you write a lot in your personal life? Do you work in a writing career? Have you been published?

Pastoral ministry by its nature involves a lot of writing. Crafting a sermon certainly involves an element of creativity combined with information. I've also done quite a bit of classroom instruction which requires a lot of writing.

On the creative side, only occasionally do I get to indulge. Our church does Vacation Bible School, and the VBS packet a church purchases always has a drama element to get the kids interested. Guess who is in charge of VBS drama every Summer? Yep! That ordinarily doesn't involve writing, but some years what we purchase is so poorly written I can't bring myself to do it, so I scrap the whole thing and write my own. I try to not do that, since it is very time consuming...but I do it now and then. I'm so hard to please!

Oh, yes, I did publish a book way back in 1999 on the subject of Christians and their entertainment choices. I have more book ideas in my head, but I will likely never get to them until I retire. I would like to write some biographical books for kids about some of America's great heroes.

Here is a list of the plays Mr. Wilson has written for his project participants, his club, and all of us to enjoy.

Canyon Coyotes Drama

Originally, our skits were a fun addition to the Communications project. We did spoofs of Get Smart (4-H 86), It's a Wonderful (4-H) Life, A Charlie Brown 4-H, Star Trek (The Four Ks), and our own version of the Abbott and Costello routine Who's On First called Who's the President.

These skits go back to at least 2001. But the competition became quite challenging, and another club had full plays that came for a Drama project, so we decided to create a separate project for Drama in the 2005-2006 year. Our first play was a spin-off of the Knights of the Round Table.

The State is again having a Discussion Meet competition at State Field Day. For the contest, the members are judged on their skills in committee meeting discussion. A manual on Discussion Meet is available on the state website along with videos showing a Discussion Meet contest in action. The 2016 topics for the Discussion Meet are as follows:

- 1. The 4-H Youth Development Program has been successful in recruiting new members for years. How can 4-H make the best better by using successful methods from outside organizations to boost interest in 4-H and, therefore, increase membership in the modern age?
- 2. How can you help 4-H'ers identify and analyze actions related to a water resource and its use?
- 3. How can 4-H'ers develop the knowledge and skills necessary to address challenges relevant to the study of the environment?
- 4. How can 4-H'ers learn by doing within the community to provide youth with field research experience, technical expertise, and an opportunity to reflect on their own development?
- 5. When nations make decisions about healthy living, what are some of the dilemmas and consequences that might impact people around the world? How can 4-H'ers decrease some of those negative results and/or increase the positive results?

The state Discussion Meet competition will be held at State Field Day on May 28th in Davis. Practice discussion meets are being scheduled for this spring. A Discussion Meet will be held at LA County Field Day on March 19 at Mt. SAC and another Discussion Meet will be held at South Section Field Day on May 21 at Mt. SAC. These are two great opportunities for our LA County senior youth to practice their Discussion Meet skills before the state competition, where scholarship money is awarded to the top four finalists.

• VERY IMPORTANT - Use New Record Book Manual For 2015-2016

The state 4-H office has released a new 2015-2016 California 4-H Record Book Manual, which is now considered to be the current manual and we are told to discard all previous record book manuals. Please use this manual for your 4-H records this year (2015-2016). A second manual California 4-H Record Book Forms 2015-2016 contains the forms to use with the first 2015-2016 manual. Please use these forms for your records this year. Across the top of each form is the phrase "California 4-H Record Book 2015-2016". DO NOT USE FORMS FROM PRIOR 4-H RECORD BOOK MANUALS. A third record book manual for leaders came out this fall from the state office. We will have these manuals on the county website. The first two manuals are currently on the state website.

There are some changes for 4-H record keeping. Be sure to look at these new manuals as you record your 4-H activities during the year. This year Seniors are asked to include a resume in their record book. The Junior and Teen Leadership Development form has been replaced by the new Leadership Development Form. Expression pages for project reporting are not optional. If you have questions contact a member of the county I&R Committee or Noel Keller (nkeller91711@gmail.com).

• State Record Book Competition

Senior 4-H members are eligible to enter the state record book competition. State competition is focused on selecting 4-H members who have demonstrated outstanding achievement in their 4-H project work. Books are judged against standard criteria. Those books displaying the most outstanding 4-H work, life skills development, and leadership and citizenship development are selected as state medalists and/or state winners. Senior 4-H member (at least 14 years of age and no older than 19 years old by December 31 of the program year for which the book is being entered) are eligible to enter state competition.

Encourage your experienced Senior members to submit their records for the state competition. No additional pages are needed beyond what is submitted to the county competition. Accomplished senior members should be encouraged to start working on their record books now for the 2015-16 competition. Set goals and plan ahead to have a great year in a project area. Districts should consider having workshops on completing record books during the year. There is a lot of good project work being done in LA County, but it is not being entered in the state competitions.

To be eligible to enter the state record book competition, seniors must complete a brief online record book course on the state website and submit a letter of intent to submit your record book to our county office by June 30th, 2016. Mark your calendar in May to remind yourself to take the record book course, so you at least have the option to submit a your record book to state in October.

• 2015-2016 Officer Book Forms

The 2015-2016 Officer Book forms and information for the 2016 Officer Book Recognition program are available on the county website. All club and Hi-4H officers are encouraged to prepare their officer records for award consideration after the end of the program year. Officers should start working on this now. The evaluation of the officer records is done with the Danish system of judging so all officers have the opportunity to earn a Gold medal for their officer work.
