Sonoma County is experiencing a demographic shift where the Latino population has increased by over 300% in the past 20 years. Nearly 37% of Sonoma County youth between age 5 and 18 identify as Latino, but the Sonoma 4-H community is comprised of less than 10% Latino youth. To address this issue, Sonoma 4-H is growing, expanding, and diversifying with new 4-H Clubs during afterschool at schools in Santa Rosa and Windsor, serving primarily Latino youth.

Summer Day Camps— In 2016, 64 youth and 9 volunteers participated in four weeks of day camp. In LEGO-based activities, youth completed challenges through team work and design thinking. In Civics, youth learned about city planning, the law making process, and public transportation. Programs also offered fun sports activities like flag football and basketball in a non-competitive environment to promote healthy living and sportsmanship.




Outcomes— Youth felt a sense of belonging and displayed high levels on indicators of positive youth development. Over 85% of youth agreed they can handle problems that come up in their lives; 100% agreed it is important for them to do the right thing; and 92% agreed they care about contributing to make the world a better place for everyone.


COMPETENCE PERCENT OF MAXIMUM POSSIBLE




CONNECTION
PERCENT OF MAXIMUM POSSIBLE




CHARACTER
PERCENT OF MAXIMUM POSSIBLE




CONFIDENCE
