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Things you need to know...



4-H Record Books & Completing the 4-H Year

In order to receive credit for the 4-H year and receive a year pin and service stripe, members must complete the Annual Project Report (APR) for each project completed. This is a two page report form. If your goal is to receive Star Ranks (Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum & Emerald), Junior Leader opportunities, County 4-H Ambassador (All Star), and scholarships, you will need to complete your Personal Development Report (APR).

Record Book Evaluations:

Club Level evaluation—Each community club leader will set a due date for record books to be turned in at the club level. This is usually the last week of August or the first part of September. Once they are turned in, they will be evaluated, and those books receiving a gold seal will eligible to compete at the county level.

Members who complete the Annual Project Report (APR) will receive credit for the year and will receive a year pin and service stripe.

County Level evaluation—4-H Record Books competing in the County Record Book judging must be received in the 4-H office by Tuesday, September 16 by 5 pm. Late books will not be accepted.

The County Record Book judging will be on Monday, September 16th @ 5pm at the 4-H office.

Clubs must send one (1) evaluator per 4 books submitted from your club.

A record book must be evaluated at the club level before it can be evaluated at the county level. Those books receiving a gold seal are encouraged to participate in the county book judging. <u>Only those books that have proper forms, signatures, etc. will be evaluated at the county level</u>.

How do you join? We have put together a series of screen shots to walk through the steps of joining any Lassen County 4-H Club:

As of July 18, 2024, ZSuite is open for families and volunteers to self-enroll.

- Those families that were active in our program for any year between 2018-2019 to 2022-2023 but did not enroll for 2023-2024 will have the same login email for ZSuite as they did in 4-H Online but will need to click the Forgot Password? link on the system login page.
- Parent/Guardians and Volunteers will select the Primary Profile, locate the household member, and click Enroll Member Now or Enroll Volunteer Now.


There are eight 4-H clubs in Lassen County. Pick a 4-H club you would like to join, then contact the club leader, or stop by the 4-H Office at 707 Nevada Street.

Enrollment is open **September 1 through November 15**, but enrollment in some clubs may become closed during that time depending on their size and capacity.

Any youth between the ages of 5 through 18 are eligible to enroll.

The youth member insurance fee is \$75.00, and the adult volunteer leader insurance fee is \$28.00.





As the new 4-H year starts here in Lassen County we would like to introduce four remarkable young people that have earned the title of County Ambassador. This rank is no easy feat to achieve. It requires that they be at least fourteen years old and hold the rank of a Gold Star in the program.

Gold star requirements are completion of eight projects (repeated years of the same projects counts), fifteen project skill activities, attending forty 4-H events, completing thirty leadership development activities and holding at



least two significant leadership roles, participating in thirty community service activities, completing thirty six communication skills (which includes giving at least 10 presentations) receiving fifteen honors or awards and an optional requirement of having thirty healthy lifestyle activities.

It can take members their entire 4-H career to earn a Gold Star.

The application process to become an ambassador requires letters of reference, essay questions and an in-person interview. The goal is that the members will develop skills needed to interview for future scholarships and job opportunities.


Milford 4H Club News

After all, it's always been in our DNA.


