

Ag Ombuds in simple terms


1. All Ombuds serve as a bridge

- Resolving complaints
- Investigating failures
- Mediating conflict
- Facilitating understanding

My mission is to...


- Promote Economic Development in rural communities

A day in the life

- Phone call w/ rancher re: ag worker housing project –
 explain county's demands, break down fee schedule, steer
 toward fee waivers/relief
- Communicate with group of county staff working on improving ag worker housing permit process
- Distribute RFP for collaborative county-wide assessment of housing needs
- Link university researcher with local farm for field trials
- Investigate FDA rules around approving new forage supplement for use with livestock

A day in the life

- Set up meetings with two regional water boards around potential new slaughter plant
- Research insurance requirements for new ranch enterprise, look for insurance provider that can answer rancher's questions
- Schedule site visit to ranch building a new barn
- Connect rancher with SBDC advisor
- Plan workshop content related to food safety rules and use of biological soil amendments

A day in the life

- Recruit expert on farmer co-ops to speak with group of ranchers exploring a joint enterprise
- Organize tour of local dairy for group of organic certifiers
- Field inquiry from random public citizen wanting to know about Marin agriculture
- Connect a farmer with resources for finding new land
- Explain Healthy Soils Program to a rancher
- Prepare for EcoFarm workshop

When I get back...

- Visit ranch, explain pond measurement/reporting rules, help rancher translate data from pond recorder
- Conduct outreach to entire ag community re: upcoming deadlines for state water board reports
- Help rancher find relief funds following outbreak of mycoplasma, appeal FSA denial
- Help rancher understand permit process for vineyard establishment
- Track down new meat processor, draw them into rancher group

When I get back...

- Plan 2 talks:
 - Poultry producers on-farm slaughter
 - Farm business management workshop environmental regulations
- Touch base with long-standing projects:
 - New ranch road/stream crossing
 - Remodel of ag worker housing
 - Daylighting illegal ranch pond
 - New (old) potato variety
 - Dairy using byproduct for vodka

When I get back...

- Check on new legislation for ranch slaughter
- Update factsheets
- Do more outreach on new website (growninmarin.org)
- FIND NEW ENTERPRISE IDEAS!

Not all AO's are the same

- 1. Different "host"
- 2. Different funding stream
- 3. Different job description
- 4. Different needs within the ag community
- 5. Different network of allies

...but there are similarities

The birth of an Ag Ombuds

- 1. Catalyzing event
- 2. Argument is made
- 3. Champions and allies are recruited
- 4. Stakeholders are engaged
- 5. Campaign is mounted



- 1. Catalyzing event with county Supervisor(s)
 - "Ag summit" (convening of farmers)
 - General Plan update
 - Direct appeal from stakeholder group



2. Establish convincing arguments— the benefits

- Economic development
- Keep ag land in agriculture
 - Stable land tenure, stave off development, climate benefits of working landscapes
- Help pre-application = better applications
- Insight for regulators into agriculture
- Improved compliance
- Better relationships, morale for all



3. Recruit Champions & Allies

- County Supervisor(s)
- Management within key county departments
 - Planning, Building & Safety, EHS
- Ag Commissioner



4. Mobilize stakeholders

- Farmers
- Farm Bureau
- CAFF, RCD, NRCS, UCCE
- Local Food Policy Council
- Farmers market associations
- Land trusts
- Economic Development (EDB, SBDC)
- County staff



5. Mount the campaign

- Time (2-4 years)
- May unfold in phases
- Be persistent, be strategic



Prepare for the evolution...

Changes will affect how AO does their job

- Host entity may change
- Focus/needs of community may change
- Staff turnover (AO and regulators)

Longevity is correlated with success
